USI STAFF MEMBERS RING "CHRISTMAS BELL." Mr. William Leth, humanities art workshop supervisor, and Mr. Keith Benedict, engineering lab supervisor, joined forces to restore the "voice" of the Old Courthouse clock, completing the project in time for the bell to count down the hours to Christmas, 1985, in downtown Evansville.

They were answering a call for help from the Conrad Baker Foundation, which manages the Old Courthouse, and made the project a joint offering from the USI Divisions of Engineering Technology and Humanities. The work started just after Labor Day and, using campus facilities and tools crafted to keep the work authentic, the two lab supervisors put the clock in operation at noon on Christmas Eve. Some supplies were donated by Welder's Supply, so that the work was completed at no cost to USI or Conrad Baker, and saved the non-profit agency some \$1,500 to \$2,000. Mr. Leth and Mr. Benedict documented their work and set up a maintenance schedule designed to keep the clock ringing out the hours in the future -- a future they say could stretch over the next 250 years.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Charles T. Barber, professor of political science, participated January 9-10 in the Second Regional Conference on University Teaching at New Mexico State University. Educators from 23 states were invited to make presentations. Dr. Barber's paper was "The Electoral College in 1988: A Model for Nationwide Campus Simulations."

Dr. Walter Jermakowicz, associate professor of business, has had his book, Das Wirtschaftliche Lenkungssystem Polens -- Indikatoren and Determinanten seiner Entwicklung, 1944-1984" (English translation: The Polish Management System -- Indicators and Determinants of its Development, 1944-1984) published by the J. G. Herper Institute, Marburg-Lahn. The 90-page volume was published in the fall of 1985.

Mrs. Mary Lue Russler, administrative assistant in the Development Office, received notification on January 8 from the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Washington, D.C., certifying that she is an approved member of the DAR "by virtue of (her) descent from a patriot who rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence during the Revolutionary War."
