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AREA LABOR-MANAGEMENT GROUP TO RECEIVE FEDERAL GRANT

The Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service has selected the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum as one of 14 committees, along with a national conference, to receive \$1 million in grants in support of labor-management cooperation programs. **Mr. Peter Regner**, FMCS director of staff operations and programs, said FMCS "sees four areas this year that are emerging as key concerns among our applicants: using new technology to increase productivity, coping with a shrinking workforce, employee empowerment and organizational effectiveness, and economic development."

The \$38,000 grant to expand Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum programs is among four awards to committees which have economic development as a primary focus. **Mr. Timothy B. Mahoney**, coordinator of the forum headquartered at USI, said their goals are to educate the labor-management community on the benefits of cooperation, improve the labor-management image in order to enhance economic development, and assist current economic development efforts in order to improve the climate and diversify the economic base, thus creating new jobs. Specific 1989-90 objectives, he said, have been:

- * Development of a data base listing features of contract negotiations and settlements, including time frames, innovations, significant changes, work stoppages, and effects on the work force.
- * Completion of a survey of labor, management, and the community (public and private sectors) identifying problem areas and educational and training needs in the 10-county service area.
- * Development of at least three specialized education programs in response to needs identified in the survey.
- * Creation of a newsletter and resource guide for service area distribution, emphasizing cooperative labor-management efforts and promoting networking opportunities.
- * Expansion of the statewide and national network in which to disseminate information about the current status of area labor-management relations and their progress in cooperative efforts.

The forum-sponsored "Partners for Success" series last spring, focusing on employee involvement, attracted 975 representatives from more than 65 Tri-State organizations. The initial program this fall -- "How Labor and Management Can Deal With the Media" -- will be held at 8 a.m. Wednesday, November 15, in the University Center.

The USI Executive-in-Residence program is designed to stimulate students' thinking and to broaden their education through discussions and interaction with leaders in business, industry, and government. **Mr. Derry** is a native of Washington, D.C., and an engineering graduate of Kenyon College in Gambier, Ohio. A Navy veteran, he joined GE in 1973 and held various engineering and manufacturing positions in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. **Mr. Derry** was transferred to the Mt. Vernon plant in 1977 and has been manager of both the LEXAN and VALOX resin manufacturing operations. He also has held managerial positions in Mt. Vernon at the BPA plant and the LEXAN resin chemical and finishing operations.

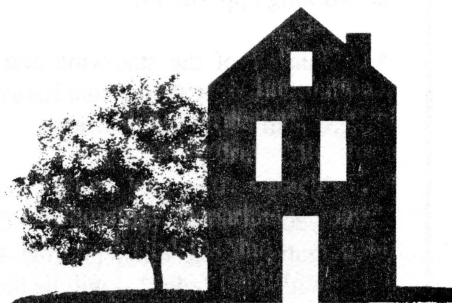

SMOKING POLICY REVISED. The University Smoking Policy has been revised in response to compliance with the Indiana Clean Indoor Air Law. Beginning November 1, smoking will be allowed only in designated areas. Signs are being posted at University building entrances during October, indicating "Smoking is Permitted Only in Designated Areas." Signs indicating "Designated Smoking Area" will be posted clearly in the approved areas. Copies of the revised Smoking Policy and Guidelines will be distributed to staff members during October and will include the list of designated smoking areas.
