HEALTH NOTES

Stress "Flu"

One in 10 Americans suffers from a particularly unpleasant performance anxiety -- a big meeting or a tight deadline turns their bowels to water. Researchers at the University of Arizona recently found that the digestive systems of people with "irritable bowel syndrome" may be sensitive to a brain chemical released during stress.

Most victims blame their painful cramps and diarrhea on a virus. Thomas F. Burks, head of pharmacology at the university, has another theory. When you're under pressure, your hypothalamus sets off the "fight-or-flight" response. This reaction lets loose a flood of hormones, including corticotropin-releasing factor (CRF), which raises your blood pressure and heart rate. It's likely that the unlucky 10 percent are oversensitive to CRF.

Kaopectate and similar products offer only partial relief from stress-induced "flu." A CRF blocker could do more. Testing is under way at Arizona and several drug companies. (American Health April 1989)
