ALAN T. NOLAN, CIVIL WAR HISTORIAN

Mr. Alan T. Nolan, an Evansville native who has achieved eminence as an author of Civil War history, will be featured in programs on April 9-10 that are part of the University of Southern Indiana 1992 Community of Scholars series bringing Evansville people back to the city to share their experiences.

Mr. Nolan will speak at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 9, in Forum II at USI, discussing his acclaimed but controversial book, *Lee Considered: General Robert E. Lee and Civil War History*. The book is a realistic picture of the Southern general that was published in 1991 by the University of North Carolina Press. It was the main selection of the History Book Club for August 1991, and a Book of the Month alternate selection for September 1991.

Mr. James M. McPherson, author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning *Battle Cry of Freedom*, has said: "This book will change our perception of the South's premier icon. With a deft pen and sure grasp of essential questions, Alan Nolan separates the Lee of reality from the Lee of mythology. No student of the Civil War can afford to ignore the challenging and controversial conclusions of this study."

The public is invited to this free program in the Community of Scholars series designed to broaden educational opportunities beyond the classroom. The series was inaugurated by the University in 1986 to celebrate in a lasting manner the attainment of separate university status the previous year. This year's programs are featuring people with Evansville ties.

TORNADO WARNING PROCEDURES

Mr. Barry J. Hart, Safety and Security director, reminds everyone that we are entering "tornado season" and USI does not have an audible alarm for tornado warnings. The Physical Plant dispatcher monitors several sources of weather-related information and -- if a "tornado warning" is issued or there is a decision for some other reason to alert everyone to seek shelter -- each building will be notified by a telephone call to a building coordinator, who in turn will alert building occupants.

Weather-related emergencies dictate that building occupants seek shelter in the lowest point of the building (see page 7 of the USI 1991-92 telephone directory) and stay away from windows and doors. Elevators should not be used and movement should be in an orderly fashion.

Dr. Gordon is considered to be an expert on the assassinations of President John F. Kennedy, Senator Robert Kennedy, and Dr. Martin Luther King. He will discuss the political ramifications of assassination and how the murders of political leaders have been investigated.

Dr. Gordon began his investigations into the Kennedy and King assassinations while studying for his master's and doctoral degrees in at Indiana University. The assassi-

nations in the 1960s had such an impact on Dr. Gordon that he majored in history at Hamilton College and focused his efforts on political assassinations. He has served as a technical adviser to specials on all three major television networks and the Public Broadcasting Service.

On Friday, April 10, Mr. Nolan will discuss his work in city classrooms. Mr. Richard Borries, social studies director for the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, said Mr. Nolan will visit with Mr. Bill Bartelt's ninth-grade advanced placement class at Harrison High School at 8:40 a.m., then go to McGary Middle School to meet at 10:30 a.m. with the eighth-grade U.S. history classes taught by Mr. Bill Seibert and Mr. Robert Spear.

Mr. Nolan's first major work was *The Iron Brigade*, a military history published in 1961 by Macmillan Company; second and third editions were published respectively by the State Historical Society of Wisconsin in 1975 and the Historical Society of Michigan and Hardscrabble Books in 1983. *The Iron Brigade* has been named by *Civil War Times Illustrated* as one of the "100 best books ever written on the Civil War." It remains in print after 30 years.

Mr. Nolan is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Historical Society, a Fellow of the Company of Military Historians, a founder and former president of the Indianapolis Civil War Round Table, and formerly was a director of the Association for the Preservation of Civil War Sites. A graduate of Indiana University

and Harvard Law School, he practices law in Indianapolis with the firm of Ice Miller Donadio & Ryan.

Mr. Nolan also is the author of *As Sounding Brass*, a contemporary novel published by Houghton Mifflin. He has written for *Civil War Times Illustrated*, *Civil War* magazine, *Indiana Magazine of History*, Oxford University Press' *American National Biography*, and other periodicals.

Mr. Nolan is the grandson of two former Evansville mayors -- Democrat John J. Nolan and Republican Charles G. Covert, both of whom also became state legislators and Evansville postmasters. Mr. Nolan was born in Evansville in January 1923, and attended St. Benedict and Stanley Hall schools before the family moved to Indianapolis when his father, Mr. Val Nolan, was named U.S. attorney for Indiana. The father was Evansville city attorney prior to that appointment. Mr. Nolan's mother, Mrs. Jeanette Covert Nolan, was a prolific writer who had been an Evansville newspaperwoman before her marriage and later wrote children's books and detective stories and other fiction for adults. Fifty of her books were published.

The session was dedicated to the memory and work of Mr. Karl J. R. Arndt of Clark University, Harmonist scholar who published nine books and many articles on the Harmony Society founded in 1814 in New Harmony, Indiana. He died in October 1991 at age 88. Ms. Leigh Ann Chamness of Historic Southern Indiana Project also presented her paper on "The Secession of Dr. Christoph Mueller from the Harmony Society" at this session.

Dr. Leslie J. Roberts, assistant professor of French, has had an article, "Etienne Cabot and his *Voyage en Icarie*," published in *Utopian Studies*, the journal of the Society of Utopian Studies. Dr. Roberts has received a \$3,600 grant through the Extended University Program to collect music by contemporary French singer-songwriters and to give several workshop/concerts of French music in Indiana next fall.

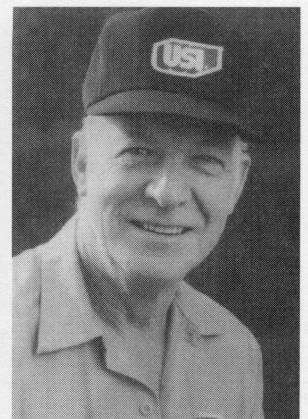
