## Lincoln season dedicated to Warford

Lincoln Amphitheatre's 2004 season will open with the musical drama *Young Abe Lincoln* Friday, June 18. The season is a particularly special one, dedicated to the memory of Becky Warford, senior administrative assistant in the School of Liberal Arts, who died April 13 at VNA Hospice.

"Becky made critical contributions to Lincoln Amphitheatre's success," the program dedication reads.

"We knew her as a co-worker, but she played many other roles: devoted church member, pianist, student, teacher, daughter, sister, friend, and above all, loving mother and wife. We'll never forget her intelligence, kindness, and courage. She is deeply missed."

The story of Abraham Lincoln's childhood on Indiana's frontier will be on stage June 18-August 6. Created especially for the amphitheatre, *Young Abe Lincoln* tells the story of the nation's 16th president growing up in Indiana.

After playing Nattie Grigsby on the amphitheatre stage last season, Christian Goad will tackle the role of Boy Abe this year. The honor-roll student, who recently completed sixth grade at Sharon Elementary, also has appeared in the chorus in *The Music Man*, as Will Rogers Jr. in *The Will Rogers Follies* at Castle High School, as Snow Child in Carousel at University of Evansville, and in church productions.

Sean Patrick Doyle, a senior in the musical theatre program at Catholic University of America, is returning for a second season in the role of Young Abe. His credits include Mark in A Chorus Line, Goofy Clark in Best Foot Forward, Cain/Judas in the world premiere of The Word, soloist in Civil War, The Emcee in Cabaret, Bobby in A Chorus Line, and Puck in A Midsummer Night's Dream.

Zachary Nadolski, a voice and theatre student at Vanderbilt University, will appear as Teen Abe. His favorite college roles include El Gallo in *The Fantasticks*, Leon Czolgosz in Assassins, The Pirate King in *Pirates of Penzance*, and The Husband in Amelia al ballo. He is the winner of the National Association of Teachers of Singing vocal competition and has performed in a master class for Dawn Upshaw.

Dean Dorrell will portray the amphitheatre's President Lincoln for a fourth season. Winner of the Association of Lincoln Presenters' 2003 Abraham Lincoln of the Year Award, Dorrell has been performing on stage for more than 30 years and has portrayed Lincoln for nearly nine. He holds a life membership in the Association of Lincoln Presenters and for 19 years has worked for Four Rivers Resource Services, which provides services to people with disabilities.

# Field lab open house June 12

Artifacts uncovered at this summer's New Harmony public archaeology dig at Community House No. 2 will be displayed at an open house from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, June 12.

Archaeologists from the Indiana State Museum will display a variety of items during the open house, which is free and open to the public. A tour ticket is not required for the event.

The open house also will feature tours of the dig site, information about artifact processing, and viewing of a Computer Assisted Drawing program of the site.

Students and staff working at the site will be available to discuss the dig, what has been located, and how the uncovered artifacts change the interpretation of the structure's story.

To date, several different types of artifacts have been located, confirming the structures' service during its 180-year history as a multi-use building. Constructed circa 1824, it first served as a Harmonist bruder haus (community house), accommodating unmarried members of George Rapp's Harmonie Society.

During the Owen period (1825-27), the building was used as a school. Through the 19th and 20th centuries, Community House No. 2 was used as a tavern, an inn, a print shop, a hardware store, and a boarding house. The 2004 dig has uncovered new items, including some indicating the structure also may have been used as a dental facility.

# City of Aurora receives HSI award

The "City of Spires," Aurora, Ind., is this year's recipient of Historic Southern Indiana's Community Legacy Award.

Leslie Townsend, program coordinator for Historic Southern Indiana, presented the award to Aurora Mayor Donnie Hastings in a ceremony June 7 at the city's Lions Building.

The annual award recognizes a southern Indiana community for outstanding achievements in preservation, enhancement, and promotion of its distinctive heritage.

"Aurora exemplifies all of the qualities that are part of the Community Legacy Award," Townsend said.

Located on the Ohio River, roughly 35 miles west of Cincinnati, Aurora's nickname, "City of Spires," recognizes the many church steeples that are part of the city's landscape.

Aurora's preservation and revitalization efforts include renovating City Hall, the oldest continuously operating city hall in Indiana; revitalizing and promoting Main Street and the Historic District; obtaining a grant to maintain the historic character of several buildings; expanding riverfront development; and hosting heritage-related festivals.

As the 2004 Community Legacy Award-winner, Aurora received \$1,000 in support of heritage-related projects and a plaque of achievement for public display.

The city was selected by a panel of judges comprised of representatives of Historic Southern Indiana, Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana, the Indiana Department of Commerce, Division of Community Development and Division of Tourism, and the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology.

Previous recipients include West Baden Springs, Madison, Orleans, and Rising Sun.

Historic Southern Indiana, a heritage-based regional outreach program of University of Southern Indiana, supports a coalition of individuals and agencies committed to preservation, development, and promotion of the cultural, historic, and natural resources of southern Indiana. Since 1986 it has offered a variety

of programs and projects to improve the quality of life in the 26 southernmost counties of the state.
