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"BACK HOME AGAIN" AT LINCOLN CITY. A special exhibit of 62 photographs from the book, Back Home Again: Indiana in the Farm Security Administration Photographs, 1935-1943, by **Dr. Robert Reid**, vice president for Academic Affairs, will be on display daily from Sunday, June 26, through Saturday, July 23, at Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial. The photographs, selected for the display by Dr. Reid, focus on the one-third of the nation President Roosevelt described as "ill-housed, ill-clad, and ill-nourished," and provide a striking visual memory of what the Hoosier state was like 50 years ago. The Great Flood of 1937, land erosion, inadequate, housing, farm auctions, and people at play are some of the events documented in this photographic display of Indiana rural life.

WOMEN'S MUSIC FEATURED. The Ars Femina Ensemble, a professional musicians' cooperative dedicated to the performance of women's music of the 17th and 18th centuries, will appear in concert at 8 p.m. Friday, June 24, in Thrall's Opera House at New Harmony. Made up of the baroque instruments of violin, viola, cello, and harpsichord, the ensemble also includes several rarely heard instruments such as the viola d'amore and bowed psaltery. The group has combed archives throughout Europe and the U.S. to bring its largely unpublished repertoire to performance. The ensemble's program will include works by Isabella Leonard (1620-1704), Maria von Paradis (1759-1824), Elizabeth-Claude Jacquet de la Guerre (1666-1729), Maria Margherita Grimani (fl. 1713-1718), and one of the oldest surviving pieces of music by a composer from the middle ages -- Hildegard von Bingen (1098-1179).
