



CONGRATULATIONS TO THE WOMEN'S SOFTBALL TEAM. The ISUE women's softball team won the IAIWA tournament last weekend by defeating the University of Evansville 6 - 1 and IUPUI 2 - 1 and 6 - 0.

Saturday's first game against IUPUI lasted for 15 innings. Gina Mantino was the pitcher for all three games, and in Saturday's championship game, she pitched a perfect game. Gina and two of her teammates, Pam Bracken (catcher) and LaQuitta Pophan (right fielder), were named to the all-tournament team.

This is the first time ISUE has won the state championship in softball. The team, coached by Ruth Waller, now advances to the Midwest Tournament at Wright State this weekend. On Friday, May 8, the team plays the University of Charleston at 10:30 a.m. If they win that game, they will play the winner of the St. Francis vs. Wright State game at 12:30 p.m. Indiana will be represented by both ISUE and IUPUI in the tournament.

CREF RETIREMENT INCOMES UP. Annuity income payments made to retired participants by the College Retirement Equities Fund will rise by 36.5% beginning May 1, 1981, according to the chairman and chief executive officer of CREF and its companion organization, Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association.

CREF variable annuity income, based on common stock investments, is paid to retired participants in the form of annuity units. The number of units payable to a participant remains the same from year to year, and the dollar value of each unit changes once each year on May 1. This yearly change reflects primarily the investment experience of CREF's common stocks for the preceding fiscal year, April 1 through March 31.

The May 1, 1981 annuity unit value is \$35.86, up from \$26.27. For example, this means that a retiree receiving 20 annuity units per month, and therefore \$525.40 monthly since last May, will receive \$717.20 monthly -- 20 times \$35.86 -- for the coming twelve months. Yearly changes in the annuity unit value since CREF began in 1952 have ranged from decreases of as much as 17% to this year's increase of 36.5%.
