



NEW HARMONY TO FEATURE CZECH ARTIST

"Beauty and Truth: the Graphic Works of Czechoslovakian Artist Jiri Anderle," will open with a public reception from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, May 20, at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The exhibition will continue through June 30.

New Harmony Gallery is presenting this special and timely exhibition in cooperation with Jacques Baruch Gallery of Chicago, with 22 etchings from 1974 to 1988 to be shown. Included will be "Dialogue with the Grand Masters," wherein Mr. Anderle borrows images from Leonardo, Carravagio, and Goltzius, among others. Also represented will be the "Antique Series," which features characters from Greek mythology, and the "Illusion and Reality" series which deals with photographs of soldiers from World War I. In all of the series, Mr. Anderle transforms familiar images from history into commentary on contemporary society.

Mr. Anderle currently lives and works in Prague. His work can be found in such prestigious public collections as the National Gallery in Washington, D.C., Metropolitan Museum in New York City, Centre Georges Pompidou in Paris, and the Victoria and Albert Museum in London.

MR. RAY MARSHALL TO LECTURE

Mr. Ray Marshall, former Secretary of Labor from 1977 to 1981, will deliver a public lecture on Wednesday, June 13, in a program co-sponsored by the Indiana Gender Equity Cadre and the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum. Mr. Marshall will discuss his theories on "America's Workforce, Education, and Problem Solving" at 7 p.m. in Forum I. A reception in UC350 will follow the lecture.

Mr. Marshall holds a chair in economics and public affairs at the University of Texas-Austin and serves on the Board of the Carnegie Corporation. He also is chair of the Action Council of the Quality of Education for Minorities Project. He is the author or co-author of 25 books on economics, labor, and education.

The Gymnasium is an elite high school in which upper grades are equivalent to the first year in an American college. This is Dr. Wolfe's third Fulbright award. Her exchange professor will be Mr. Werner Filzmann, who will teach German courses at USI next year.

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YOUNG ABE LINCOLN AND NEW HARMONY THEATRE TO OPEN IN JUNE

Young Abe Lincoln, the outdoor musical drama, will open its 1990 summer run on Friday, June 15, at Lincoln State Park, while Alfred Urhy's *Driving Miss Daisy* will open New Harmony Theatre's Season 1990 on Saturday, June 16.

Young Abe will be presented at 8 p.m. daily, except Mondays, through Sunday, August 26.

Miss Daisy will run for three weekends. Other plays in New Harmony Season 1990 will be John Patrick's *The Curious Savage*, opening July 13, and Tina Howe's *Painting Churches*, opening August 10. All are comedies that explore the pleasures and pressures of American families. They will be presented at 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays and 2 p.m. Sundays.

New Harmony Theatre again is offering University employees and students season tickets on a four-for-two basis. Regular tickets are \$10; season tickets are \$24 for three plays. The price for the USI com-
