Crisis counselor to lecture

Dr. Chrys J. Harris of Greenville, South Carolina, an expert on critical incident stress debriefing (CISD), will be a guest lecturer for Mr. Gary May's social work class at 8 a.m. Friday, June 23, in the Orr Center (room 2036). Mr. May has invited members of the area CISD team and other social work classes to attend the lecture, and is opening the session to the public.

CISD has powerful implications for preventing future mental health problems for trauma survivors and caregivers. Addressing the difficulties immediately allows people to reframe intense emotion as "normal" vs "abnormal" and permits them to "own" the reactions and minimize negative consequences. "Debriefings" have been done in a variety of natural and man-made disasters.

Dr. Harris has worked in the post-traumatic stress field since he was involved with a Charleston program for returning Vietnam veterans in the early '80s. He is licensed or certified on state and international levels as a marriage and family therapist and therapy supervisor, professional counselor and counseling supervisor, trauma counselor, school psychologist, and as a master practitioner in neuro-linguistic programming.

He is a graduate of Wofford College, Wake Forest University, and Purdue University, where he was a course coordinator and instructor while enrolled in the doctoral program. He has been a stockholder and associate with Linder, Waddell and Harris, P.A., in Greenville since 1991.

Young Abe Lincoln

The gala opening night celebration for *Young Abe Lincoln* will get under way at 6 p.m. Friday, June 16, with a light country supper at the Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial. Guests will be entertained with dulcimer music and at 7:30 p.m., will go to the nearby Lincoln Amphitheatre for the drawing for such prizes as three days in Las Vegas (donated by World Class Travel of Santa Claus, Indiana), tickets to a St. Louis Cardinals baseball game, tickets to an Evansville Otters baseball game, O'Charley's gift certificate, and more.

The *Young Abe* performance at 8 p.m. will introduce a new opening number and a new emphasis on "Indiana's Lincoln," as the outdoor musical opens for its ninth summer of telling the story of the 16th president's life in southern Indiana, from age 7 to 21. The new song, "Makin' a Home on Pigeon Creek," highlights the Lincolns' move from Kentucky to Indiana and the raising of the cabin in which they lived. The music is square dance caliber and designed to encourage audience participation.

Tickets for the Lincoln Amphitheatre fundraiser are \$30 for adults, \$25 for senior citizens, \$20 for students, and includes the supper, drawing, and *Young Abe* performance at 8 p.m. Call 800/246-4AABE for information.

The musical *Big River*, which captures the spirit of Mark

Twain's classic Huck Finn tales, will open Friday, July 7, as a companion production with *Young Abe*. The two will be presented on alternating nights through the season, which ends August 19. Curtain time is 8 p.m. daily, closed Mondays; the amphitheatre also will be closed July 4-5-6 as the cast prepares for the *Big River* opening.

The New Harmony Theatre

The American Masters Festival for Season '95 at The New Harmony Theatre will open Friday, June 16, with Tennessee Williams' *Orpheus Descending*, the tale of a handsome vagabond musician befriending a woman storekeeper in a small southern town. The production continues through Saturday, July 8, at Murphy Auditorium, where curtain times are 7:30 p.m. Thursdays, 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, and 2 p.m. Sundays.

A \$40 season subscription is available to USI family members, with other summer productions including the comedy *You Can't Take It With You* and Thornton Wilder's *Our Town* at Murphy, and the musical *I Do! I Do!* at Thrall's Opera House. The regular season ticket is \$48; a single general admission is \$14, student/senior citizen, \$13, and groups of 20 or more, \$12 each. Some 250 Chinese treasures are being displayed in the Memphis Wonders series, a sumptuous collection of art, furniture, personal possessions, and historical objects from the tombs of China's emperors. Many scholars consider the Chinese Imperial Tombs greater treasure troves than Egypt's pyramids. The July 28-30 trip will include an optional Friday night walking tour of Beale Street, birthplace of the blues, with dinner and entertainment at B.B. King's Blues Club. The \$315 fee covers transportation, lodging at the Peabody Hotel, exhibits, and some meals; the Beale Street tour is \$40. July 5 is the deadline to register.
