1998-99 Men's Basketball Outlook

Rebuilding, reassembling, reconstructing, and reloading are all words which describe the task before University of Southern Indiana Head Coach Bruce Pearl in 1998-99.

Pearl, who is the nation's leading active coach in wins with a 154-30 (.837) record, as well as USI's all-time winningest coach, plans to keep USI among the nation's elite.

Last year, the Eagles were 27-6 overall, 14-4 GLVC. They won the Disney Division II Tip-Off Classic, defeating three nationally-ranked teams in as many days. USI was ranked **NUMBER ONE** nationally for several weeks in December and January, finishing eighth in the final poll. The 27 wins are the third highest in school history.

The 1995 national champion, USI has reached the national finals twice and the regional finals four times in the last six years. To succeed this year, Pearl will have to replace the top three scorers from last year, who were first team, second team, and honorable mention All-GLVC performers. The Eagles return two starters and seven letterwinners as a foundation.

Senior forward **Leighton Nash** (Waterloo, Iowa), an honorable mention All-GLVC selection, is the Eagles' top scorer with 11.7 ppg and 4.5 rpg. He also led the GLVC in field goal percentage (.700, 78/112) during league play.

Senior forward **Joel Thomas** (Evansville, Indiana), the Most Valuable Player in the 1997 Kenny Kent National Shootout, is hoping to make the same progress he made a year ago. Bouncing back from reconstructive knee surgery in 1996-97, he averaged 8.6 ppg and 5.6 rpg.

They are joined by senior guard/forward **Tim Tooley** (Huntingburg, Indiana), who averaged 5.4 ppg and 4.1 rpg in 28 games, despite missing five games with an injured ankle.

To give the team some depth in the frontcourt, the Eagles added junior transfer **Habib Ademi** (Krsko, Slovenia), a forward; sophomore transfer **Kim Green** (East St. Louis, Illinois), a forward/center; and freshmen **Diondre Givens** (Mt. Vernon, Indiana), a forward; **Dan Luse** (Bloomfield, Indiana), a forward/center; and **Kurt Stackhouse** (Plymouth, Indiana), a guard/forward.

Ademi averaged 10.5 ppg and 6.3 rpg at Bossier Parish Community College, while Givens averaged 21.4 ppg and 8.7 rpg at Mt. Vernon High School. Green, who announced his intentions to play for USI late in the summer, averaged 10.8 ppg and 6.1 rpg at Southeastern Community College in Iowa.

In the backcourt, senior guard **Ryan Owens** (Princeton, Indiana), junior guard **Kevin Herdes** (Shelbyville, Illinois), and junior guard **Ryan Kelley** (Evansville, Indiana), will direct the play.

Herdes, who started 19 games as a sophomore, averaged 4.2 ppg and 4.2 assists. Owens, who split time between the point and the shooting guard position late in the season, averaged 4.6 ppg and 4.0 assists.

Hoping to challenge for the starting shooting guard position is Kelley. Kelley, who showed signs of being the answer for USI from beyond the three-point arc, averaged 7.0 ppg and 2.3 rpg last year.

At the point guard position, the Eagles have a solid bench with the return of junior **John Bucher** (Bloomfield, Indiana), who walked onto the team in 1997-98. He played crucial roles when both Herdes and Owens went down with injuries and missed four games.

Pearl has added some experience to the backcourt with the addition of senior transfer guard **Junior Bond** (Decatur, Illinois) and junior transfer **Josh Cain** (Kouts, Indiana). Bond transfers to USI from the University of California-Irvine where he averaged 5.5 ppg and 3.5 assists in 27 games, while Cain transfers to the Eagles from Northwest College in Powell, Wyoming.

Before transferring to USI, Bond was named the Best Small Player in the NJCAA Tournament at Illinois Central College.

Beginning their first full season on the varsity are freshman guards **Matt Carter** (Cannelton, Indiana), and **Mark Pitcher** (Franklin, Indiana). Carter was second in the state in scoring and voted second team All-State at Perry Central High School as a senior in 1996-97.

The regular season will feature 22 Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC) games as each team will play home-and-home schedules. A GLVC team has appeared in the NCAA Division II National Championship game each of the last five years.


The Eagles' GLVC schedule will begin on the road this season when they travel to Lewis University on Saturday, November 28. USI won the GLVC title in 1994, 1996, and 1997, and finished third in the regular season and second in the first-ever GLVC Tournament in 1998.

The league schedule at the PAC will start on Thursday, December 3, against Northern Kentucky University and Saturday, December 5, versus the University of Indianapolis, hosting both for the first time since the 1996-97 season. Eagles fans will be treated to 11 conference doubleheaders at the PAC this year.

The City of Evansville will play host to the second annual GLVC Tournament at Roberts Stadium from Wednesday through Saturday, February 24-27. The top eight teams will travel to Evansville for the tournament in each of the next three seasons.

The 1998-99 schedule also includes the always-exciting Kenny Kent National Shootout, in its tenth year. The Shootout features USI, Armstrong Atlantic State University, University of North Alabama, and Saginaw Valley State University. USI will play 24 of its 26 regular season games against teams from the powerful Great Lakes Region.

In six seasons Bruce Pearl has made the USI men's basketball program a fixture among the NCAA Division II's elite. Pearl's teams have a record of 154-30 (.837), making him one of winningest active college basketball coaches in America.


Pearl led the Eagles to a **NUMBER ONE** national ranking each of the last four seasons. In 1997-98, USI was 27-6 overall, placed second in the first-ever Great Lakes Valley Conference Tournament, finished third in the GLVC regular season with a 14-4 record, won the Walt Disney Division II Tip-Off Classic (Division II's Preseason NIT), and was the NCAA Division II Great Lakes Regional finalist.

USI has set two school records during his tenure — six consecutive NCAA Division II Tournament appearances and six consecutive 20-win seasons. Pearl's Eagles also have been in the Great Lakes Regional finals in four of his six seasons and is only one of two schools in Division II having earned berths in the NCAA Tournament the last six seasons.

In 1995-96 and 1996-97, he led the Eagles to their first back-to-back Great Lakes Valley Conference championship seasons since 1980 and 1981.

Pearl, whose Eagles have won the GLVC title three of the last five seasons, also became USI's all-time leader in wins in 1996-97. In five of the six seasons, the squad has finished as either the GLVC champion or only one game out of first.

Over the six years, Pearl, who at age 37 has proven to be one of the brightest young coaches in the nation, has coached two players named national Player of the Year; four players named All-American; two players named GLVC Player of the Year; three players named GLVC Newcomer of the Year; five players named first team All-GLVC; and ten players named Academic All-GLVC.

6 YEARS **154-30 (.837)**

In 1994-95, Pearl, the NABC National Coach of the Year, led the Screaming Eagles to the University's first NCAA Division II National Championship. Pearl's Eagles also captured their second straight Great Lakes Regional championship, finished the regular season ranked fifth nationally, and had a 29-4 overall record.

In 1993-94 Pearl directed the Eagles to what was then their best season in school history (28-4) and finished the regular season ranked ninth. The Eagles earned a GLVC championship (16-2), a Great Lakes Regional championship, and played as a finalist in the NCAA II championship game. Pearl became only the second coach in GLVC history to be named conference Coach of the Year in two straight seasons, and reached 50 wins faster than any coach in USI history.

In his initial season, Pearl led the Screaming Eagles to a 22-7 record, a second-place finish in the GLVC with a 14-4 record, a berth in the NCAA Division II tournament, a final regular season rank of 11th, and received his first GLVC Coach of the Year award. The success of the team in 1992-93 was the biggest turnaround in GLVC history after inheriting a squad which finished 10-18 overall, 4-14 GLVC, in 1991-92.

Pearl, who also serves as athletics development officer at USI, has spurred unparalleled growth in scholarship contributions to the Varsity Club. This fan support has revived basketball enthusiasm at the PAC. Attendance is at an all-time high as the Eagles expect to sell out half of the GLVC schedule.

Prior to coming to USI, Pearl was an assistant coach at the University of Iowa, where he was responsible for implementing full-court pressure defensive tactics. He also was responsible for the performance of Iowa's inside players, particularly the offensive and defensive post players. Coach Pearl taught many current professional basketball players, including

Brad Lohaus (San Antonio Spurs), Acie Earl (Milwaukee Bucks), B.J. Armstrong (Charlotte Hornets), Kevin Gamble (Sacramento Kings), and Matt Bullard (Houston Rockets).

During Pearl's six-year stay at Iowa, the Hawkeyes received five tournament berths, one final eight appearance (1987), one final 16 appearance (1988), and placed eight players in the National Basketball Association. While at Iowa, Pearl helped Head Coach Dr. Tom Davis to a 129-63 record. For his efforts, Pearl was recognized in 1988 as one of the top Division I assistants in the country by *Basketball Weekly*.

Upon leaving Iowa, Pearl ended 14 years as an assistant and right-hand man to Dr. Davis. Prior to joining Davis at Iowa, Pearl was Davis' assistant coach (1982-83) and an associate head coach (1983-86) at Stanford University. As an undergraduate, Pearl was Davis' administrative assistant at Boston College (1978-82).

Pearl received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Boston College in 1982, graduating *cum laude*. He is working toward a master's degree at Iowa.

Pearl and his wife Kim have two daughters, Jacqui and Leah, and two sons, Steven and Michael.

Assistant Coach Rick Herdes

Rick Herdes begins his seventh season at USI as Coach Bruce Pearl's top assistant coach. Herdes is considered to be one of the best recruiters in Division II basketball. This year's recruits are no exception. He directs the scouting activities of the University and the highly successful Southern Indiana summer basketball camps.

In six seasons with Coach Pearl and USI, Herdes has helped direct the Eagles to a 154-30 overall record (.837), the 1995 NCAA II National Championship, the 1994 NCAA II National Finalist finish, three Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships, five straight NCAA II Tournament appearances, and five straight 20-win seasons.

Herdes came to USI from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, where he was an assistant from 1986 to 1992. While at SIUE, Herdes helped Head Coach Larry Graham lead the Cougars to a 127-56 record and three NCAA tournament appearances. He was responsible for coordinating on- and off-campus recruiting. He also was academic advisor to the basketball team and director of summer camps and fund-raising events.


In 1991 and 1992 at SIUE, he was the head coach for the Illinois Prairie State Games, Southern Open Men's Division. His 1992 team received the silver medal.

Prior to working at SIUE, Herdes was an assistant basketball coach and physical education instructor at Lawrenceville (Illinois) High School, where he worked for current Indiana University Assistant Coach Ron Felling. LHS was the Illinois Class A State Champion in 1982 and 1983 and had a 68-game winning streak. Herdes was inducted into the Illinois High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 1998.

Herdes graduated from Graceland College in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in education. He is completing a master's in secondary education at USI.

As a player, Herdes led Lincoln Trail College to a ninth-place finish in the national tournament and helped lead Graceland to its first-ever appearance in the NAIA Tournament.

Herdes has two children, a daughter Taylor, and a son Connor.



Assistant Coach Marc Hostetter


Marc Hostetter enters his second season as an assistant coach for the University of Southern Indiana after playing for four seasons in an Eagles uniform on an NCAA Division II National Championship team, an NCAA II Finalist team, four NCAA II Tournament teams, and three Great Lakes Valley Conference championship teams. He also teaches part-time in USI's Academic Skills Department.

Hostetter joined Coach Pearl on the sidelines after four years of directing the team on the court and is USI's all-time leader in assists and played in more games than any other Eagle. He also is a two-time honorable mention All-GLVC and Academic All-GLVC player.

H. Ray Hoops, President


A native of Illinois, H. Ray Hoops received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Illinois University and master's and doctoral degrees in Audiology and Speech Sciences from Purdue University. He also completed an M.B.A. at Moorhead State University.

His career as a scientist and educator has included a faculty appointment jointly at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University. He published extensively and was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical patients with cancer of the larynx and in the analysis of language dynamics resulting from brain damage. Among his numerous publications in a variety of behavioral and medical journals was the report on a study which received the National Research Award, the highest honor of the American Speech and Hearing Association. Dr. Hoops also was named a Fellow of the Association.

His administrative appointments included the directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. He received two national service awards for that work. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar in the College of Medicine at the University of the Philippines. Other appointments included dean of the Graduate College of the University of Northern Iowa, associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, vice president for Academic Affairs at North Dakota State University, and president of South Dakota State University.

In the six years prior to becoming the second president of the University of Southern Indiana in 1994, Dr. Hoops served as the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Mississippi. While at "Ole Miss," Dr. Hoops received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in the innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

Dr. Hoops and his wife Linda, academic marketing leader for the Educational Foundation of the National Restaurant Association, are the parents of a daughter Victoria, an M.B.A. graduate of Ole Miss who is a marketing professional for the trust division of an investment firm in Louisville, Ky.



USI Director of Athletics Steve Newton

Steve Newton, a native of Terre Haute, Indiana was named the athletic director in 1995.

Named to the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional Advisory Committee in 1997, Newton has brought enthusiasm and pride to the University and the Athletic Department. With an emphasis on community service, he has directed the creation of the Eagle Math program for grade school students, the Letterwinners Club, and the Screaming Eagle Scholarship program.

Newton also has placed an emphasis on assisting student athletes to reach their full potential both academically and athletically. To help the student athlete, he has overseen the creation of the extended aid program for fifth-year students.

Prior to taking the position at USI, Newton was serving as an assistant athletic director at the University of South Carolina. He was the head basketball coach at South Carolina from 1991 to 1993.

His duties at South Carolina included serving as the university representative for pre-Olympic preparations for the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta and the South Carolina steering committee for the Olympics.

Newton served as head coach at Murray State University from 1985 to 1991. During his eight seasons as head coach, he was 136-100 (.576). His Murray State team's best run in the NCAA Tournament was in 1988 when it defeated North Carolina State University before losing to eventual national champion University of Kansas, 61-58.

As a head coach, Newton was named the Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1990; National Association of Basketball Coaches District VII Coach of the Year in 1988; and led Murray State to four consecutive Ohio Valley Conference championships and post-season tournament appearances, 1988-91.

Newton received a bachelor's degree in physical education and master's in education from Indiana State University. Named a member of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame Silver Anniversary team in 1984, Newton and his wife Kathy have four children—daughter LeAyer, and sons Harv, Jay, and Royce.

Putting the Student in Student-Athlete

Over the last few years, the NCAA and its member colleges and universities have worked hard to emphasize the student in the term student-athlete. Academic standards and rules have been developed and changed to ensure that student-athletes can excel in the classroom as they do in their sports. The result of these reforms has been that student-athletes are more likely than ever before to succeed in the collegiate environment.

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program was developed by the NCAA to help prepare student-athletes for the challenges of life beyond the playing field. The focus of the program is on commitments viewed as critical to personal growth: academic excellence, personal development, service, and career development. In addition, NCAA schools work hard to offer further academic support programs to help student-athletes prosper. These programs offer access to study facilities and tutors as well as monitor student-athlete progress.

One result of these programs is that NCAA Division I student-athletes have been consistently graduating at a rate higher than the rest of the student body. For the class entering college in 1989, 57 percent of the overall student body at NCAA Division I institutions graduated, while Division I student-athletes graduated at a rate of 58 percent. The rate does not include student-athletes who transfer to and graduate from another institution.

Minimum academic requirements that student-athletes must meet to play sports as freshmen in college are one reason for the higher graduation rates. In 1982, a group of college presidents, sponsored by the American Council on Education, proposed a set of minimum academic standards to determine freshman athletics eligibility. The first set of standards was implemented in 1986. They required that freshmen graduate high school with a minimum grade-point average of 2.000 in 11 core academic courses and a minimum standardized test score of 700 on the SAT or 15 on the ACT to be eligible to play sports and receive an athletics scholarship.

Two years ago, the number of required core academic courses was raised to 13 and last fall, a grade-point average and test-score sliding index went into effect. This scale allows student-athletes with higher grades to qualify with lower test scores and vice versa.

Wanna Play? Know the Rules

Any high-school student who is interested in playing sports at the NCAA Division I or II level should learn about the standards as early as possible. In addition, high-school student-athletes should talk to their guidance counselors and coaches to learn more.

High-school students can also call the NCAA's Eligibility Hotline, 1-800/638-3731. This number features recordings with information on a number of freshman eligibility topics, including accommodations for students with learning disabilities. Students can also order a free copy of the "Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete" by calling the hotline and following the prompts.

The NCAA's Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse ensures that student-athletes have met the academic requirements and certifies their eligibility to play sports as a freshman. High-school student-athletes aspiring to play Division I or II athletics should register with the clearinghouse after completing their junior year.

Clearinghouse information and registra-

tion forms are available from high-school guidance counselors; from the NCAA Eligibility Hotline (1-800/638-3731) or from the NCAA Clearinghouse, P.O. Box 4044, Iowa City, IA 52243-4044, telephone 319/337-1492. The clearinghouse keeps registered student-athletes informed about the qualifications they have and have not met concerning freshmen eligibility.






Once student-athletes are enrolled in college, there are more academic standards to be met. Student-athletes must show continuing progress toward a degree each year, including a minimum number of credits passed. From the junior year on, these standards place great emphasis on progress made toward a specific degree program and ensure that student-athletes don't accumulate large numbers of credits that won't help them earn a specific degree.






The NCAA also has established various scholarship and grant programs to encourage student-athletes to pursue their undergraduate and postgraduate degrees. The Degree-Completion Grant program assists those who have exhausted their eligibility for institutional financial aid. There are also Women's and Ethnic Minority Enhancement programs and several postgraduate scholarship opportunities.






The end result? Student-athletes are now more likely than ever to enter their collegiate programs prepared and ready to succeed athletically and academically. ■











