COLLEGE NIGHT OCTOBER 31

College Night, a program for high school juniors and seniors and their parents who are interested in information about all phases of college life, will be held on October 31, 1973 at 7:30 p.m. at Indiana State University Evansville. College Night is sponsored by the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation.

College representatives from approximately 40 institutions of higher education are expected to participate in College Night. Classes beginning at 5:00 p.m. or after on October 31 will be cancelled. Extended services classes, however, will meet. Day classes will meet according to the regular schedule. Dean Donald Bennett explained, "With approximately 2600 people expected to participate in College Night, it is a necessity that evening classes be cancelled to accomodate this program."

Junior and senior college bound students from all Evansville high schools and Mt. Vernon High School will meet with college representatives in three separate 35 minute sessions. The first session will begin at 7:30 p.m. Harold Calloway, ISUE Financial Aids Director, will conduct three sessions on the different aspects of financial aid available to college students. William Straeffler, ISUE Director of Admissions, is coordinating College Night.

the European Community Delegation in Washington D.C. The European Community is made up of nine member nations -- Belgium, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, and most recent members Britain, Ireland, and Denmark.

Organized in 1950, the European Community has helped transform a large part of Western Europe from a group of war-ravaged and traditionally hostile nations into one of the world's most prosperous, most stable and most democratic regions. The Community has become one of the world's largest economic units. Its unified market of over 250 million people accounts for about a fifth of world trade, leaving aside the trade among the nine member states themselves.

Born in the United Kingdom, Mr. Morris studied at the Sidcot School in Somerset and was graduated from Cambridge University in 1952 with an Honors Degree in History. Mr. Morris has worked in the Directorate-General for Press and Information at the Commission of the European Communities in Brussels since 1968. He is responsible for information to non-member countries. Topics he will cover in his presentation include transatlantic relations, U. S. - European Community trade, monetary and security issues, investment policies, and the impact of British entry into the European Community on U. S. European Community relations.

The general public is welcome to hear Mr. Morris at ISUE on October 26 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 292 of the Classroom Science Center.
