



**EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE.** The Spring semester Executive-in-Residence program has been scheduled for Friday, April 1, 1977 in the Conference Center at ISUE. The Division of Business will host Dr. Leon T. Kendall, President of Mortgage Guaranty Insurance Corporation and Executive Vice-President of Mortgage Guaranty Investment Corporation since 1974. A graduate of Indiana University, Dr. Kendall was elected in 1973 to the Academy of Alumni Fellows of the Graduate School of Business, Indiana University.

Dr. Kendall presently serves on the Marquette University President's Executive Senate. His presentation at the noon luncheon will be "Money, Capital Markets, and Interest." Off-campus guests are being invited to attend the luncheon program at a cost of \$3.00. To encourage the participation of ISUE faculty, staff, and students the price of the luncheon will be \$1.50 for campus persons.

**ART COLLECTION DISPLAYED.** The current exhibit on the second and third floors of the library is taken from the Helen Wallace Art Collection in the Special Collections Department. Miss Wallace, a native of Mt. Carmel, Illinois, worked as an artist for a Chicago newspaper during the 1930's, and after viewing the latest movies of that period, she came up with her own unique "reviews", as expressed in her pen and ink drawings now on display. Some of the movies included in these reviews are BEN HUR, STELLA DALLAS, KIKI, THE BIG PARADE, and THREE FACES EAST, with such stars as Ronald Colman, Lon Chaney, Clara Bow, John Barrymore, and others.

**BIOETHICS STUDIED IN SERIES.** Prominent professionals addressing critical questions in the area of biological technology and moral and ethical values will be featured in the series, "Bioethics, The Interface of Biology and Society" being offered at ISUE in a six week series beginning March 31.

The program originated at Ball State University in Muncie where six nationally recognized scholars and scientist gathered to address the critical issues of biological technology and the moral and ethical questions involved. Because of the impact of biological technology on our society, these lectures were taped for rebroadcast at ISUE and will serve as the core of a six-part community forum designed to make the public aware of the dimensions and potential of biological technology and the bioethical issues that could be, and have been, raised.

The sociological, medical, legal, psychological, theological and cultural aspects of bioethical questions will be considered. Each program will begin with a taped lecture followed by the reactions of a panel of local humanists, biologists, and medical, legal, and health service professionals. Each program will conclude with audience responses and interaction between the panel and the audience.

**BIOETHICS, CONTINUED.** "New Developments in Biology: Society Coping with Conflict" will be the first session offered at ISUE. Dr. Daniel Callahan, Director, Institute of Society, Ethics and the Life Sciences, Hastings-on-the-Hudson, N.Y. will be the speaker. The local panelists will include *THOMAS WILHELMUS*, ISUE Assistant Professor of English, moderator; *MELVIN DENNER*, ISUE Professor of Life Science and Karen Ott, UE Associate Professor of Biology. This session will be held in Room A34 beginning at 7:00 p.m.

The collections of his work include In The Outer Dark and Giraffe from Louisiana State University Press and most recently Out-of-the-Body Travel published by Ecco Press as part of its American Poetry series. Plumly has been editor of the influential Ohio Review and has taught at the University of Iowa Writers' Workshop. He currently is teaching at Princeton University.

The Humanities Forum will also sponsor a panel discussion from 2:00-3:00 p.m. in the Library Rare Books Room. The topic will be Collective Bargaining for University Professors. Panel members will be Dr. Carl Metz of Hanover College and state chairman of AAUP.
