



USI FOUNDATION TOPS \$1 MILLION IN ANNUAL GIVING

A \$50,000 contribution from Mrs. Ruth Lilly on June 1 in support of RopeWalk Writers Retreat pushed the USI Foundation over the \$1 million mark for the fiscal year.

Mrs. Suzanne A. Nicholson, Development director, said it is the first time annual giving topped the million-dollar level, counting contributions in hand for all University programs -- athletic and academic -- that are administered through the Foundation office.

The majority of the support is earmarked for scholarships, although unrestricted giving is approaching 20 percent, she said.
