



VOCATIONAL EDUCATION TELECONFERENCE

A 90-minute live/interactive teleconference on "Preparing Vocational Education Teachers for the 21st Century" will be aired at 1 p.m. Wednesday, September 30, in UC352. The teleconference will originate from Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Virginia, and is sponsored by the National Center for Research in Vocational Education (NCRVE) at the University of California-Berkeley and the University Council for Vocational Education.

The program will explore ways vocational teacher preparation can be aligned with educational reform, changing student needs, and changing workplace requirements. Ms. Mildred B. Griggs, NCRVE site director and vocational/technical professor at the University of Illinois, will moderate the teleconference. Panelists will be Dr. Richard L. ECONOMIC EDUCATION AWARDS. Regional awards of the Indiana Council for Economic Education and the Joint Council on Economic Education were presented recently by the affiliated Center for Economic Education headquartered at USI, making the winners eligible for state awards in the separate categories.

Mr. Robert Koch II, president of George Koch Sons, Inc., in Evansville, received the Paul Samuelson Enterprise Award for community leaders, recognizing dedicated service to education and leadership in promoting economic education. Samuelson was an early Nobel Prize winner in economics.

The 1992 Olin W. Davis Award for exemplary teaching of economics went to Ms. Sharon Odom, Castle High School, Newburgh; Ms. Elizabeth Culiver, Hebron Elementary School, Evansville, Ms. Marlene Plemmons, Brumfield Elementary School, Princeton, and Mr. Mike Duncan, Castle, received honorable mentions. A CEE committee reviewed reports on the teachers' current work in the classroom to select the winner.

Mr. Chad Hudson, a Castle student, received the Young Economist Award and Mr. Noel McDonald, retired principal at Hebron, received the Lawrence Senesh Award for school administrators.

Promoting economic literacy is the primary purpose of ICEE, JCEE, and the USI Center, which is directed by Dr. Gregory P. Valentine, USI assistant professor of business. The awards were presented as part of Economic Education Week.

USI LICENSED. USI recently became a licensed associate of the Public Broadcasting System's Adult Learning Satellite Services (ALSS). The agreement allows the University to tape a wide variety of educational programs off satellite at a reduced rate, with a restriction of one copy per program, to be used only within the institution for education purposes.
