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WELCOME. Dr. C. Thomas Pickering and Dr. Glenn A. Pitman have assumed duties as deans of the School of Education and Human Services and School of Business, respectively. They join Dr. James R. Blevins, dean of the School of Liberal Arts, Dr. Nadine A. Coudret, dean of the School of Nursing and Health Professions; Dr. Frank L. Stanonis, dean of the School of Science and Engineering Technology, in overseeing University operations under the structure which became effective July 1. It also includes Dr. Gorden E. Kelley as associate dean of Health Professions.

Dr. Pickering previously was dean of the School of Education at Fort Hays State University, Kansas, where he administered a school with four academic departments and was certification officer with primary responsibility for overseeing 47 state-approved teacher and administrator education programs. He received the B.S.Ed., M.Ed., and Ph.D. degrees from Ohio University, Athens, and taught in Ohio, North Carolina, and Mississippi prior to going to Fort Hays three years ago.

Dr. Pitman had been assistant dean for graduate programs since 1984 at the University of Connecticut School of Business Administration at Storrs. He has been involved with MBA curriculum reorganization at each institution he has been affiliated with -- UC, Pennsylvania State University, and West Virginia University -- and participated in American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business accreditation, which will be sought for USI business programs. He received the B.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Penn State and M.B.A. from the University of Miami.

- * Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his reclining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- * The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

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
