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IAN JAQUISS SETS NATIONAL RECORD. Ian Jaquiss, a member of the ISUE Aquatic Eagles, recently set a national and state record in the Ohio State Wheel Chair Games at Ohio State University.

In the 50-meter breaststroke, Jaquiss broke the national record with a time of 45.97 seconds. His state record time for the 400-meter freestyle is 7:19:07. Jaquiss' times in the 50-meter butterfly and the 100-meter individual medley also are outstanding, in light of the fact that he swims without the use of his legs. In addition to swimming competitively, he has passed advanced lifesaving and is currently taking a water safety instructor class at ISUE. He will attend Arizona State University next year, where he plans to participate in competitive handicapped weight lifting.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Robert L. Reid, vice president for academic affairs, was a delegate to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Wingspread Conference on Teacher Preparation, which took place May 6 -8 in Racine, Wisconsin. This national conference brings together academic vice presidents, deans of education, and secondary school principals. The theme of the conference was "The role of AASCU institutions in reforming teaching preparation programs." W. Ann Reynolds, chancellor of California State University and a former commencement speaker at ISUE, delivered the keynote address for the opening general session.

Dr. Robert Gehring, associate professor of psychology, presented a research paper at the Midwest Psychological Association May 3. "Recall of Video vs. Audio Events" reported research in which college students studied either an easy-to-learn-from information lecture, or the same informational content in the form of a silent videotape presentation. The instructions were to study without notes in order to be able to remember as much as possible. Video "lecture" yielded significantly better learning than standard narrative lecture, and resulted in a slower rate of forgetting over a one-week period.

MAY IS NATIONAL HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE MONTH. During the month of May, the University Notes will bring you tips from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the National Institutes of Health, the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, and the National High Blood Pressure

Education Program, on how to spot high blood pressure, how to avoid it, and how to control.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE IS A FAMILY AFFAIR.

Doctors have found that high blood pressure runs in families. There is a chance of more than one member of a family having hypertension. So if family members learn to watch weight, cut back on salt, get more exercise, and deal with high blood pressure, they will benefit. They will be helped as they help you treat your high blood pressure.

Give your family members things to do to help. Your doctor or nurse can tell you how to have someone take blood pressure readings and record progress on a chart. A family member might be asked to remind you about daily medication. Family members also can help with pill refills, with doctor visits, and with getting help from other health workers like educators, nutritionists, or dietitians.

Friends can help, too. Changes your doctor asked you to make--such as reduce your weight, use less salt, exercise more, or smoke less--affect activities often done among friends. A friend can be very helpful. Tell someone if you need help following your doctor's advice.
