SENIOR, PROFESSOR HONORED FOR ACHIEVEMENTS. At the University's Honors Day Convocation held April 19, ISUE's two top awards went to Neil J. Martin, a senior biology major from Boonville, Indiana, and Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, who established an international reputation for his research into communal societies. Martin received the University's first President's Medallion, and Pitzer was chosen Distinguished Professor.

A biology major, Martin will graduate magna cum laude in May, 1984. He was one of the first applicants to be accepted to the Indiana University School of Medicine where he will enroll in the Fall. In addition to being named to the National Dean's List, Martin's academic achievements include the ISUE Academic Scholarship, the Academic Achievement Award for Pre-Medicine, the Alcoa Foundation Scholarship, and the ISUE Presidential Service Scholarship. He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Noel J. Martin.

Honored by his colleagues for the high degree of excellence he has maintained in his work through the years, Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, is the 1984 recipient of the Distinguished Professor Award. He was the founder of the National Historic Communal Societies Association, of which he serves as executive director, and of the Center for Communal Studies, which has its home in the University Library. Since 1974, he has organized and directed the Historic Communal Societies conferences attended by scholars throughout the United States and several foreign countries. His publications on communal living include the American Communal Music of the 18th and 19th Centuries, New Harmony's First Utopians, New Harmony's Fourth of July Tradition, and Robert Owen's American Legacy.

Among his memberships are the Indiana Historical Society, the National Communal Societies Association, the American Historical Association, and the Evansville-Vanderburgh Historical Association. Awards are not new to the Distinguished Professor, who received outstanding professor citations from students in 1972, and again in 1979. He is listed as an Outstanding Educator of America.

ISUE AMONG HOSTS OF STATE MATHEMATICS CONTEST. ISUE will be one of fourteen sites for the 1984 State Mathematics Contest. To date, 247 local and area high school students have pre-registered to take tests in one of four areas - Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, or Comprehensive. The written portion of the statewide contest will be followed by a local Math-o-rama competition. The year's contest is being directed by Dr. David Kinsey, associate professor of mathematics.

SHIELD RECOGNIZED AT STATEWIDE CONVENTION. Staff members of The Shield were recently recognized at the 1984 Indiana Collegiate Press Association Convention.

In the "Student Newspaper Division II" contest, The Shield received a first place award in the "Best Editorial Campaign" division for an article written by Kenny Wallace in 1983. A third place was awarded for an ad designed by Charles Burgner in the "Best Art and Copy Combination" division.

During the annual ICPA executive officer elections, Ken Harper, editor of The Shield, was elected president of the ICPA for 1985.

CHICAGO ART AND THEATRE TOUR BEGINS MAY 11. ISUE will offer its annual Chicago Art and Theatre Tour May 11-13. Participants in the tour will see the play "Dreamgirls," at the Shubert, and will enjoy shopping, sightseeing and fine dining.

In Chicago that weekend is the International Art Exposition for contemporary art at the Navy Pier, and participants may visit the museum of their choice on Sunday. The tour will leave ISUE at 8:30 a.m. Friday, May 11, and return at approximately 10:00 p.m. Sunday, May 13. Tour coordinators are Dr. James Blevins and Ms. Sylvia Neff Weinzapfel, both of ISUE.

The fee for the tour is \$175, which includes two nights double occupancy lodging at the Palmer House (Single occupancy, add \$42.), theatre tickets, bus transportation, lunch on the bus, information packet, and transportation to the museums on Sunday.

Anyone cancelling their registration prior to April 27 will receive a full refund less a \$15.00 service charge. The tour is contingent upon receipt of 25 registrations on a first-come, first-served basis. Should it be necessary to cancel the tour, refunds will be made. COMMUNITY WOMEN'S ISSUES COURSE OFFERED FOR INTERSESSION. A two-week course intended to explore social issues affecting women will be taught at ISUE during Intersession. Linda Simmons, assistant professor of social work, will teach a class entitled "Women's Issues in the Human Service," May 7 - 25 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon daily. The class is part of ISUE's Special Topics in Human Service Practice (Social Work 400) and requires no prerequisites to attend. Professor Simmons says the class will be offered not only to students, but as a community service to women. The course is set up on an audit basis, so women who have not previously attended college classes may sit in.

Topics of the course will include divorce, women and violence, women and alcoholism, sexual decision making, and eating disorders. Several local social service organizations are working with Professor Simmons in advising students.
