The ISUE chapter is currently serving a six-month probationary period during which time the faculty and business education majors will be working as a group to make final arrangements for the installation of an active chapter. Activities may include sponsoring a regional business teachers' clinic, preparing teaching aids for first-year teaching, volunteering services in business for learning purposes, evaluating the history of Pi Omega Pi, and organizing activities which might be of value to a prospective teacher of any business subject.

RUSSIAN TRAIN TRIP

A Henderson Community College History Associate Professor, Carl Boyd, featured speaker at the February ISUE History Club meeting, will discuss his train trip that took him across Russia.

A train buff since childhood, Boyd's serious effort to record as many miles as possible by train started because he realized "trains weren't going to be around forever". In ten years Carl Boyd has racked up over 85,000 miles in 26 countries, including about 45,000 on 22 railroads in the United States.

For the Russian trip, Boyd rode the Trans-Siberian Railway starting at Moscow on the Atlantic side of Russia and traveling 7,300 miles cross the country to the Pacific at Nakhodka, a trip that took seven days spent entirely on the train. His presentation for the History Club will be complimented by the color slides he took from the train windows.

Commenting on experiences of the trip Boyd explained, "Crossing the border was an interesting experience. Guards with machine guns come through the train and check your passport, your health certificate and your money. They really do a thorough job. I had to go out in the corridor while they came in and checked the bed. I guess they wanted to see if any capitalists were hiding under it. It really is a police state compared to Western Europe where you just cross the borders and checking is a mere formality."

Boyd will be the ISUE History Club guest speaker on Thursday, February 14 at 11:00 a.m. Open to the public, the discussion will be held in Room 292 at Indiana State University Evansville.
