ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY RECEIVES \$3,000 GRANT. The Division of Engineering Technology at ISUE has received an unrestricted grant of \$3,000 from the Consolidation Coal Company of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. In addition, for the third consecutive year the company has provided scholarships for two students majoring in mining engineering technology.

Mr. Ivan Rahn, manager of manpower services for the company, said Consolidation Coal contributes more than \$500,000 annually to colleges and universities throughout the nation. He said the company "is pleased to support the universities that provide education for the technical and managerial manpower needed by America's coal industry, particularly those institutions such as Indiana State University Evansville that are committed to education programs in the mining engineering career field."

NAMES IN THE NEWS. **Mr. Augustine J. Fredrich**, chairman of the Division of Engineering Technology and professor of civil engineering technology at ISUE, has received a certificate of appreciation from the American Society of Civil Engineers, Indiana Section, for his eight years of service as a member of the executive committee of the society's Water Resources Planning and Management Division. The award was presented at the recent Indiana section annual meeting, with the Board of Directors expressing specific appreciation for Mr. Fredrich's service as technical program chairman for the National Specialty Conference on Water Resource Systems, and for his role in the planning and execution of Water Forum '81, an international conference of water resources engineers and planners.

Dr. Robert B. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, was senior author of a paper presented May 2 to the Midwestern Psychological Association in Chicago. The title was "Learning from Lecture, Slides, and Video in the Context of a National Sales Training Program."

Ms. Glenda Miller, instructor in dental assisting, was elected president-elect of the Indiana Dental Assistants Association at the annual session May 2-5 in Indianapolis. She also received a first-place trophy for a paper she presented on pit and fissure sealants.

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, has had a summary of his paper, "The Owenite Tradition in America," printed in the 1984 Proceedings of the Robert Owen Association of Japan, Vol. IX. On April 26, Dr. Pitzer presented a slide-illustrated report to the Harmonie Associates in New Harmony of the 25th anniversary meeting of the Robert Owen Association of Japan in Tokyo, where he presented this paper.
