LABOR-MANAGEMENT PROGRAM TO FEATURE RETURN OF FORD

Representatives of Ford Motor Company's Louisville Assembly Plant will return to USI Thursday, October 3, to discuss "Employee Involvement -- How Well Does It Wear Over the Years?"

The program -- to be held from 8:15 to 11:30 a.m. in the University Center -- is sponsored by the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum in response to participant queries on whether labor-management cooperation keeps working over the long term, during good and bad times. Mr. Tom Ryan, Ford Industrial Relations manager in Louisville, will be the speaker.

The Ford spokesmen first appeared here in September 1988, initiating the highly successful "Partners for Success" series in which several companies discussed efforts to turn their organizations around through labor-management cooperation.

Mr. Ryan notes the labor-management climate at the Louisville plant in 1979 "represented what was bad about the automobile industry -- low morale, high absenteeism, adversarial relations. The plant ranked as one of the worst in the Ford system." During the '80s, the plant won the rights to produce the Ford Ranger truck and is considered the industry's benchmark for quality and productivity today. Employee involvement is credited with the turn-around. In spite of greater domestic and foreign competition and one of the worst recessions in automobile industry experience, the Louisville plant has expanded production to include the popular Ford Explorer and a new truck for Mazda.

American Greenways Program of the Conservation Fund. Mr. McMahon previously was president of Scenic America, a Washington-based group committed to preserving U.S. scenic beauty and cleaning up visual pollution.

The first workshop will be held at 9 a.m. Tuesday, September 24, in *The Evansville Courier* community room. Four other workshops are slated in Vincennes, Corydon, Jeffersonville, and Madison, in an effort to reach a larger audience. Workshop reservations are requested by 12 noon Monday, September 23; call extension 7014.

Mr. McMahon will use a 45-minute slide presentation to illustrate programs that have worked elsewhere in the United States. His message is that quality of life is closely tied to the appearance of our surroundings; visual pollution erodes natural, architectural, and cultural diversity and destroys sense of place; ugliness is costly, as it lowers property values, wastes energy, hurts tourism, encourages litter, and causes businesses to seek more attractive locations. Mr. McMahon will be asked to comment on southern Indiana and individual communities and the scope and quality of current local/state regulations.

Mr. McMahon assumed duties with the American Greenways Program on September 5. For the past year, he was a Visiting Fellow at the Environmental Law Institute in Washington and before that, was president of Scenic America for several years. He is an attorney and taught at Georgetown Law School from 1977 to 1986. Mr. McMahon is the author of eight books and numerous articles, wrote and produced a series of educational films for Random House, and was co-recipient of the Peabody Award for work on CBS's national news program, *Sixty Minutes*.
