**FACULTY OPPORTUNITIES.** The Lilly Endowment has announced its Faculty Open Fellowships for 1979-1980. The Endowment seeks to identify faculty of real ability whose aspirations and needs cannot be served by conventional fellowships for study and research. It hopes to find teacher/scholars in mid-career who may be in critical need of a break from academic routine and academic pressures, and who do not wish to spend the time on research. Imaginative, unconventional proposals are encouraged. Application forms are available from the Office of the Vice-President for Academic Affairs, and the completed application must be submitted by October 9. ISUE may nominate from 1-3 faculty members. The maximum single award will be \$20,000.00.

The Office of the Vice-President for Academic Affairs has received information regarding Fulbright awards for teaching and advanced research abroad for 1978-1979. Normally applications are closed June 1, but due to the small number of applications that were received, the application date is still open. Information is also available for the 1979-1980 Advanced Research in India Program for periods of two to ten months.
