

West Baden Springs wins first Community Legacy Award

The town of West Baden Springs has been selected as the recipient of Historic Southern Indiana's first Community Legacy Award. The award will be presented at 11 a.m. on Monday, May 8, on the front porch of the West Baden Springs Hotel, a town landmark recently restored.

The award recognizes West Baden Springs, located in Orange County, for outstanding achievements in preservation, enhancement, and promotion of its distinctive heritage. West Baden Springs will receive a \$1,000 cash award to support heritage-related projects and an emblem of achievement for public display. The award-winning town will receive publicity in HSI publications and can promote itself as an award-winning community in heritage preservation and tourism.

The award-winning community was selected by a panel of judges comprising the following organizations: Historic Southern Indiana; Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana; the Indiana Department of Commerce, Division of Community Development and Division of Tourism; and the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology.

"West Baden Springs is a very special town with a rich history that came close to being taken off the map," said Katy Ross, a volunteer and resident of West Baden Springs. "Local government and citizens joined by preservationists have been working long and hard to not only preserve the very special uniqueness of the town but also to tell others about our heritage."

The Community Legacy Award is an annual award, designed to coincide with National Tourism Week and Historic Preservation Week. There is no size limit of the community applying for the Community Legacy Award.

Historic Southern Indiana, organized in 1986, is a heritage-based community outreach program of USI.

National award presented to Dr. Jones

Dr. M. Edward Jones, associate vice president for Academic Affairs and dean of Extended Services, received this year's Walton S. Bittner Citation for outstanding service to the University Continuing Education Association (UCEA). This is a national award that recognizes individual achievement, contributions to the association, and to the field of continuing education. Dr. Jones is a leader in workforce issues within UCEA, the region, the state, and USI.

A long-time member of UCEA, Dr. Jones has served on the Board of Directors since 1995, and is currently the association's treasurer, chair of the UCEA Finance Committee and a member of the Strategic Planning and Executive committees. Dr. Jones served as chair of Region IV and as the region's representative to UCEA's Board of Directors from 1994-97. Under his leadership, Region IV's conferences grew to more than 200 participants. At the regional level, Dr. Jones has encouraged members to pursue professional development and contribute their talents to the field. He helped the region to develop a funded research award as well as an award to support a graduate student pursuing a degree in continuing higher education.

As recipient of this award, Dr. Jones and the University of Southern Indiana join a list of distinguished past recipients from University of Texas, University of Nebraska, Michigan State University, Indiana University, The University of Tennessee, and The Johns Hopkins University to cite a few institutions. The award was first presented in 1968 in appreciation of Walton S. Bittner's long-term commitment to the National University Extension Association (NUEA), the forerunner of UCEA. Bittner was secretary/treasurer from 1927-1956.

Names in the News

Mr. Eric Braysmith, lecturer in English and art, presented "Thick Impasto using a Fluid Medium—Van Gogh on Film," at the University of Evansville 17th annual Spring Fling in April. The presentation dealt with a comparative analysis of the 1999 documentary *Van Gogh's Van Goghs*, the 1990 Robert Altman film *Vincent and Theo*, and the 1956 film *Lust for Life* starring Kirk Douglas.

Head men's tennis coach **Jon Mark Hall** was chosen as the All-Great Lakes Valley Conference Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive season. In his five seasons as head coach, Mr. Hall has won three straight conference regular season championships and two straight GLVC Tournament championships. His career record is 85-35 (.708).

"Written Debriefing: The Next Vital Step in Learning with Simulations" by **Dr. Charles Petranek**, professor of sociology, was published in *Simulation & Gaming: An Interdisciplinary national Journal of Theory, Practice and Research*, vol. 31, No. 1, March, 2000. The article is about a debriefing technique he developed for the field of simulation and gaming. Dr. Petranek has been teaching with social simulations for 25 years.

Dr. Donald Wolfe, retired associate professor of German, delivered the keynote address at the opening of the James D. Veatch Camp Breckenridge Museum and Arts Center near Morganfield, Kentucky. The former POW camp non-commissioned officers' club was recently renovated under a \$1.3 million in grant monies from the State of Kentucky and the fiscal court. Dr. Wolfe's address was a result of his research on the German POW artist Daniel Mayer, whose paintings and murals adorn the walls of both floors of the new arts center. Also in attendance was the Frau Marthe Bolg of Augsburg, Germany, daughter of the POW artist. An additional grant will make restoration of the paintings possible. Todd Megar, a USI German and art history major, has been selected as the student apprentice for the restoration project.
