

Fall parking changes launched

University officials, anticipating that continued growth will consume available parking on campus and in University housing, have taken steps to impose restrictions for parking control.

Mr. Barry J. Hart, director of Safety and Security, said students and employees will be required to obtain rearview-mirror hang tags, replacing the window decals currently used. The hang tags will be available after August 25 - in Human Resources for faculty and staff, and at the University Center information desk for students. There will be one tag per person, to be moved from vehicle to vehicle, as opposed to the previous system of allowing one person to obtain a decal for each vehicle used on campus.

The USI Board of Trustees has authorized a parking fee, to be initiated this fall for students. The fee will vary according to the number of credit hours being taken, up to a maximum \$10 per semester. There is no fee for students taking three or fewer hours of classes. Because of realignment in offices and personnel in Student Affairs, please make note of the following operations, effective in August 1997:

Admission, Orr Center (OC1097), 464-1765 - This office introduces prospective students and their families to USI, conducts campus tours, and determines the admission status of students. The staff visit high schools and junior colleges; host receptions for prospective students, parents, and high school counselors; offer informational programs for nontraditional students; and sponsor Southern Hospitality Days. The office also processes NCAA certification for student athletes.

be a fringe benefit, thus no fee will be assessed.

Parking restrictions also will be imposed this fall, including:

• Students living in O'Daniel South. O'Daniel North, and McDonald West complexes will not be allowed to park on campus between 7 a.m. and 2 p.m. Mon day through Friday.

• Only vehicles with the appropriate housing tag will be allowed to park in housing spaces.

Mr. Hart said they will monitor the parking situation for appropriateness. "If we see that there are more spaces available than anticipated, the restrictions can be adjusted," he explained. "If there are fewer spaces than anticipated, the restrictions may be increased."

"We are trying to come up with a plan that will let everyone who chooses have a vehicle on campus or in University housing," he said.

Career Counseling, Orr Center (OC1014), 465-1136 - This new office will provide guidance to students who have not declared majors or who wish to change their majors but are undecided about a new direction. The office also will administer and evaluate career interest and aptitude inventories and use the results to assist students in developing specific education plans.

Career Services and Placement, Orr Center (OC1005), 464-1865 - This office offers career and job-related services which meet the needs of current students, alumni, employers, and other University personnel. It is responsible for job development, resume referral, and career planning education.

Registrar, Orr Center (OC1075), 464-1761 - This office is responsible for maintaining the integrity, accuracy, and utility of the academic records at USI. Proper records management facilitates regulatory compliance and helps ensure administrative integrity of student data. Control is maintained by adherence to professional, governmental, and accreditation guidelines.

To ensure proper records management, the office performs activities such as pre-registration and registration, academic record keeping and certification, grade reporting, verification of graduation requirements, transcript evaluations for transfer students, and processing requests for data. The office also is responsible for student readmission processing.

Residence Life, McDonald East, 468-2300 - Formerly University Housing, this office provides a high-quality, affordable living environment which is culturally enriching and conducive to the academic success of some 2,500 students who live in University housing complexes and off-campus accommodations. University housing includes Joseph E. O'Daniel Apartments south of Clarke Lane, Frank F. McDonald Apartments north of Clarke Lane, and Golden Tower Apartments two miles east of campus.

Student Financial Assistance, Orr Center (OC1110), 464-1767 - This office administers federal, state, institutional, and private financial aid programs; works with students to determine financial need and identify sources of assistance; and administers the fee waiver programs available to faculty and staff, their spouses, and their dependent children. Student Health Center:

This center will be available in late August, sponsored by USI and Deaconess Hospital and manned by a staff of health-care professionals at Deaconess Primary Care West two miles east of the campus. Dr. Scott Uloth, a southern Indiana native who practices at Deaconess Primary Care West, is the medical director. Students may enroll for a fee of \$37 a semester, which covers unlimited office visits during the semester. Charges for such services as laboratory testing, prescription drugs, and other diagnostic testing are not included in the enrollment fee and are the student's responsibility. The center is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (Plans are under way for a clinic to be housed on campus.) Appointments may be scheduled by calling 468-3915 during clinic hours. Walkin patients will be accepted. Telephone consultation and referral will be available after hours and on weekends.
