David St. John will read poetry as part of the pre-conference, tenth anniversary celebration. A reception will follow. Editor-at-Large of *The Antioch Review*, a Guggenheim fellow and professor of English and creative writing at the University of Southern California, St. John is the author of several collections of poetry including *Hush*, *The Shore*, and *No Heaven*. His most recent book, *Study for the World's Body: New and Selected Poems*, was nominated for the National Book Award.

Writer-in-Residence at the University of Mississippi, **Barry Hannah** will read fiction, followed by a reception. Hannah is a Guggenheim Fellow and author of *Airships, Geronimo Rex, Ray*, and *Bats Out of Hell*.

Heather McHugh and Bob Shacochis will read samples of their writing followed by a reception. McHugh is a faculty member of the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College and writes books of poetry including Shades, Dangers, and Hinge & Sign: Poems 1968-1993 and essays. Contributing editor to Harper's and Outside magazines, Shacochis is author of two collections of short stories, Easy in the Islands and The Next New World; the novel Swimming in the Volcano and; a book of non-fiction, Domesticity.
