DISABILITY OPEN ENROLLMENT MONTH. Eligible full-time faculty and administrative personnel may enroll in the University's disability insurance program during March, 1979, which is open enrollment month. TIAA disability cost is shared by the University and the employee, and is compulsory after three years of service for persons employed after July 31, 1973. No faculty or administrative person may participate in the benefit until three years of University service have been completed,

with the exception of certain personnel who have been enrolled in a similar plan for at least five years upon employment.

The benefit is detailed on page 4-6 of the ISUE Handbook. Eligible employees may obtain an acceptance card in the Personnel Office. Enrollment by March 20, 1979, assures an April 1 effective date. Premiums will be handled through payroll deduction.

INDIANA STATE TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION TRANSPORTATION STUDY. The Division of Engineering Technology is cooperating with consulting firms out of New York City and Washington, D.C. to conduct two transportation studies for the Indiana State Toll Bridge Commission. The first survey will consist of an Origin-Destination study for a 16-hour period over 5 days from Thursday, March 29 at 6:00 a.m. to Monday, April 2, at 10:00 p.m. This survey will be taken on US 41, north of the Ohio River bridge, near the Indiana-Kentucky border. Sixteen people will be needed for each of the eight-hour shifts from 6:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m.-10:00 p.m. An additional person will be required each day for the third shift from 10:00 p.m.-6:00 a.m.

A second survey will be of the same format and will be done from Thursday, April 5 at 6:00 a.m. to Monday April 9 at 10:00 p.m. This survey will be located on S.R. 62 at the Wabash Memorial Toll Bridge (7 miles west of Mt. Vernon). Four people will be needed for each of the eight-hour shifts. An additional person will be required each day for the third shift.

All personnel must either have their own transportation or be able to arrange for transportation between their homes and the survey locations. For the Wabash Bridge survey, an extra hour of compensation will be paid to those providing their own transportation.
