



STATE PERSONNEL DIRECTOR TO BE EXECUTIVE IN RESIDENCE. Mr. Robert C. Roeder, Personnel Director for the State of Indiana, will be the featured executive in the ISUE Division of Business Executive-in-Residence program scheduled for Wednesday, November 8, 1978.

At 31 years of age, Roeder is the youngest personnel director in any of the 50 states. He also is the first ISUE graduate to be featured in the Executive-in-Residence program.

Roeder graduated in 1971 from Indiana State University Evansville with a degree in business management and a minor in speech. While attending the University, he organized and for two years served as president of the Student Union Board. In 1970, he was named recipient of the Outstanding Student Achievement Award and was named to "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges" in 1971.

Upon graduation, Roeder worked as an employment counselor. In 1972, he transferred to the personnel division of the State of Indiana as a job analyst. In July of 1973, he was named supervisor of job classification for the State and served in that capacity until the establishment of the Governor's Task Force on Position Classification and Salary Administration in early 1974. As a member of that task force, he served as assistant coordinator in the development of a new classification and pay system for all State employees, and at the same time, served as a personnel specialist on the Governor's Task Force on Institutional Security. Roeder has received two Governor's commendations for his work, as well as a commendation from the Indiana Department of Civil Defense.

In January 1976, he was named Personnel Director for the State of Indiana, the position he holds at the present time. Roeder is also a graduate instructor at Indiana University/Purdue University-Indianapolis. In addition, he has served on numerous governmental panels, and as a speaker in a statewide and national programs.

Last year he was named to "Who's Who in Government," was elected President of the Indiana Society for Public Administration, established and was elected President of the Indiana Chapter of the International Personnel Management Association, was chosen to serve on the Executive Council of the National Association of State Personnel Executives, and in 1978 received the first "Distinguished Alumni Award" from ISUE.

Wrapping up the three-day session, Dr. Ernest Collomatti, Professor of Theology at St. Mary of the Woods College in Terre Haute, and Mrs. Susan Collomatti, Director of Adult Education in Terre Haute, will address the participants on "Marriage and Human Sexuality" from 7:00-8:00 p.m. and "Marriage and Parenting" from 8:15-9:15 p.m.
