Dr. Ellen Funkhouser, 1980 USI mathematics graduate who has established a career in medical research, will be the Alumni-in-Residence on Friday, November 8, for the School of Science and Engineering Technology in a program associated with Career Week. Ms. Strossen, widely praised for her lucid speaking style, has a passion for the Bill of Rights and a knack for getting that document's finer points across. She is the author of numerous books and articles, including Defending Pornography: Free Speech, Sex, and the Fight for Women's Rights, which was named a Notable Book of 1995 by the New York Times Book Review, and co-author of Speaking of Race, Speaking of Sex: Hate Speech, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties, published by New York University Press in 1995.
