Volunteer grandma shares love of reading

Lilting voices take up the joyful chorus: "Grandma Carolyn! Grandma Carolyn!"

Every Friday, youngsters at the USI Children's Center sing, shout, and giggle their greetings to **Mrs. Carolyn Kern**, who happily returns their enthusiasm.

"I'm part of the family," she recently acknowledged with a contagious grin.

Mutual affection and appreciation are also ties that bind. A participant in Volunteer USI, Kern became the Children's Center's "Grandma" three years ago, donating her time to make stories come alive for the 3- to 6-year-olds who attend morning sessions.

"I enjoy going and looking for books and thinking about how I'm going to present them - keeping up with what they're studying and seeing their bright, spirited faces every week. It's a good way to start the day," she said.


"I feel like they're counting on me and look forward to my coming, and that's good enough for me."

Ms. Ruth Miller, director of Library Services, introduced her friend, Kern, to Volunteer USI about four years ago.

"She said, 'We really need to get you over here to volunteer'," Kern recalled.

And although she enjoyed volunteering at the David L. Rice Library, the mother of two and grandmother of six later transferred her service to the Children's Center. Now, in addition to volunteering at the center, Kern serves as president of the volunteer organization's advisory board.

"That's been nice. I've gotten to know other members of the community," she noted. "I feel wanted and needed here."

She and her husband **Mr. Frank E. Kern** reside in Evansville and have been married for 40 years. He directs the Evansville Association for the Blind. She is a 1954 graduate of Evansville College, now University of Evansville, where she worked for several years.

"Coming from the Eastside and the other university setting, I never thought I'd find another university home but I did," Mrs. Kern said. "I really love it."

Volunteer USI organizes, recognizes volunteers

Roughly 2,300 dedicated individuals have registered with Volunteer USI, and about 900 actively contribute to the program's success each year.

"As the University continues to grow, the need for volunteers increases as well," said **Mrs. Nancy Johnson**, director of Alumni and Volunteer Services.

"Volunteers can be a mentor or tutor to a college student, work on a University committee, be a tour guide,



participate as an usher or greeter at University or theatre events, fund raise, share career experiences with students... The opportunities are endless!"

The University's volunteer program is unique, according to **Mrs. Trisha Kennedy**, assistant director of Alumni and Volunteer Services, because it is a formal, year-round endeavor that tracks donated hours and provides annual recognition to volunteers.

"We want to make sure we thank everybody," she noted.

Individuals donating at least 20 hours of service during a fiscal year are invited to attend an annual recognition

dinner. This year's event is planned for Thursday, Aug. 9.

Since its inception in 1996, participants have donated more than 318,640 hours of service to Volunteer USI.

University unveils new Athletic Department logo

Archibald Eagle's high-tech upgrade is the third Screaming Eagles logo to take flight during the Athletic Department's 30-year history. The new logo was unveiled Thursday, April 19.

A three-in-one configuration, it is designed for use as a whole (both text and eagle graphic), as text only, or as eagle only. It also is a gender-neutral design permitting all USI student athletes to be "Screaming Eagles" rather than being distinguished as "Eagles" or "Lady Eagles."

Ms. Jennifer Schmitz, USI's former art director, created the original logo concept later finalized by **Mr. Michael Harbison**, who assumed the art director's position last year.

The retiring "Archibald," an eagle represented as a participant in various sports, served as the University's athletic logo for the past nine years. A classic flying eagle, landing with its talons exposed, was the logo from 1971 to 1991.

Students voted to adopt an eagle mascot and the University's red, white, and blue colors in 1970. They wanted a patriotic theme recognizing USI's development on 1,400 acres designated as the Mid-America University Center.

The school fielded its first varsity teams, the "Spartans," in the late 1960s, but the Michigan State Spartans were making headlines with their own programs at the time, so a new moniker was chosen for USI.

NEH opportunities available

Through its Fellowships and Summer Stipends programs, the National Endowment for the Humanities provides opportunities for individuals to pursue advanced work in disciplines of the humanities.

Projects proposed for support may contribute to scholarly knowledge or to the general public's understanding of the humanities. They may address broad topics or consist of research and study in single fields. All eligible faculty and staff may apply.

■ NEH Fellowships - Deadline: Tuesday, May 1.

The program award is for an uninterrupted period of from six to 12 months; however, the earliest fellows may begin a project is January 1, 2002. A stipend of \$40,000 will be awarded to those holding fellowships for a grant period of from nine to 12 months. A \$24,000 stipend will be awarded to those holding fellowships for a grant period of from six to eight months.

Persons interested in the NEH Fellowships 2002 competition should make application now to meet the deadline.

■ NEH Summer Stipends - Faculty deadline: Friday, September 14. Staff deadline: Monday, October 1.

The program award is \$5,000 for two consecutive and uninterrupted months of full-time independent study or research, normally between May 1, 2002, and September 30, 2002.

USI may submit two nominations of which one must be a junior faculty member (academic applicants at the rank of assistant professor or instructor who are at comparably early stages of their careers). Those holding the rank of associate professor or professor are considered senior nominees. Faculty interested in the NEH Summer Stipends 2002 competition should submit an application to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs by Friday, September 14.

Non-faculty staff members are eligible for the summer stipends program and may apply without nomination provided they will not be teaching during the 2001-2002 academic year. Their applications should be sent directly to the NEH.

Web tips

Important questions to answer when planning a Web site include:

- What is the site's purpose?
- Who is the target audience and what does that audience want?
- Who is the content developer?
- Who will maintain the site, and how often will updates be made?

After answering those questions, gather materials that will help deliver the message, including written materials, photos, and artwork. Also collect content already available from brochures, fact sheets, press releases, curriculum guides, training manuals, forms, or applications. From the gathered material, decide how to incorporate the information into the site.

Organization of the site also must be planned. One approach is to draw a chart illustrating how information will be presented to the user. Chart the homepage, then chart links from the home page.

Possibilities for interactive functionality should be explored as well. Consider available options or functions, the technology involved, and the technology support required.

The planning stage is a good time to consult the USI Web team. A consulting session provides opportunities to discuss the project, have questions answered, obtain different perspectives, and gain understanding of how the new site will integrate with pages and sites created by other USI faculty and staff. New exhibit open in New Harmony

"Printing the Past," a permanent exhibit, opened earlier this month in Historic New Harmony's Community House No. 2.

The exhibit documents New Harmony, Indiana's, rich history of newspaper printing and features a complete 19th century print shop display as well as local newspapers, photographs, and printing memorabilia.

From 1858 to 1932, Mr. Charles Slater and Mr. Harry Slater printed *The New Harmony Advertiser* and *The New Harmony Register* in Community House No. 2. Many of the artifacts on exhibit are from the original Slater print shop.

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The recently restored Harmonist Labyrinth Temple at New Harmony was rededicated in a ceremony Friday, April 6.

The temple's restoration included roof replacement, plaster repair and replacement, historic paint analysis, and restoration of decorative paint finishes.

The project was made possible by the family of Mrs. Edmund Burke (Bertha Crosley) Ball, a member of the first New Harmony Memorial Commission.
