\$40,500 PLEDGED IN ALUMNI TELEFUND. USI Alumni Association officials are pleased with the \$40,500 pledged in support of Alumni and University programs during the recent Telefund that achieved a 16 percent increase over 1987 pledging. The record solicitation was accomplished by 120 alumni, faculty, student, and staff volunteers in 36 hours of telephone calls to USI graduates. The campaign was chaired by **Mr. John Schutz**, 1982 graduate who is a stockbroker at Hilliard-Lyons. Individual pledges averaged \$27, up 10 percent over 1987, as 1,499 USI alumni (a 7 percent increase) responded. The total included 378 new donors, also an increase over last year. The annual Telefund provides more than 80 percent of the Alumni Association budget, with proceeds used to support activities (27.83 percent); scholarships and grants (24.03 percent); capital campaigns (21.2 percent); restricted gifts (10.67 percent); the scholarship endowment (7.07 percent); and administrative costs (9.2 percent).
