Last year's cross country team placed 11th in the nationals.

- * Don't carry a lighter or matches. Hide all ashtrays.
- * When the urge to smoke hits, take a deep breath. Hold it for 10 seconds, then release it slowly. Taking deep, rhythmic breaths is similar to smoking, only you'll inhale clean air.
- * Eat rather than smoke, but stick to low-calorie, high-nutrition foods--fresh fruit or crisp, crunchy vegetables. Chew sugarless gum. (Other "pacifiers" include lemon drops, beef jerky, apple slices, celery sticks, or unbuttered popcorn.)
- * Exercise to help relieve tension. Climb stairs rather than take an elevator.
- * Drink liquids--lots of them. Stay away from coffee and soft drinks containing caffeine.

RESPIRATORY THERAPY PROGRAM ACCREDITED. The respiratory therapy program has been accredited by the Joint Review Committee for Respiratory Therapy Education, the committee which recommends accreditation to the American Medical Association, Committee on Allied Health Education and Accreditation.

CONGRATULATIONS! The ISUE student chapter of the American Chemical Society was one of 34 chapters judged "commendable" by the Society Committee on Chemical Education. The committee reviews the activities of all chapters and selects for special recognition the chapters which in its judgment have achieved superior performance. In 1981-82, there were 776 student chapters. Dr. Howard Dunn, professor of chemistry, is the ISUE chapter's advisor, and Ms. Stephanie Effinger is the chapter president.

FIREWOOD. University personnel and friends are invited to cut and collect deadwood as firewood on campus from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on the following weekends--November 20-21, 27-28, and December 4-5.

Dead trees may be felled and split for firewood. All branches from trees taken are to be removed with the firewood. No cutting for resale is allowed. Woodcutters are to register with the University's grounds crew at the Physical Plant and obtain a permit on each wood-cutting day.

ISUE GRADS IN HIGH-RANKING PROGRAMS. Dr. Andrew Jorgensen, associate professor of chemistry, reports that three of ISUE's chemistry graduates currently enrolled in doctoral research programs are attending schools whose programs rank in the top eleven in the nation. The nationwide assessment of the quality of doctoral programs that train scientists for research careers has been termed "perhaps the most comprehensive assessment ever".

Information on the assessment is being released by the National Academy of Sciences. The study evaluated individual research doctoral programs according to 16 criteria including size, quality of graduates, reputation, research support, and publications.

GRADUATES (continued). The ISUE alumni are Mary Fox Kinsey, University of Illinois at Urbana; Jerry Ludwig, Texas A & M; and Scott Thornburg, Purdue University.

Other universities which ranked in the top eleven throughout the nation include (in alphabetical order) California Institute of Technology, University of California at Berkeley, University of California at Los Angeles, Harvard University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Ohio State University, University of Texas at Austin, and the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

Barber, associate professor of political science, attended the annual meeting of the International Studies Association (Midwest) in St. Louis. He presented a 25-page paper, "Intergovernmental Organization Responses to the Falkland Islands Crisis: A Universal-Regional Comparison".

Dr. J. Eliseo DaRosa, professor of economics, attended the XXIII Conference of the Inter-American Bar Association, November 6 - 10, in Tampa, Florida, as a member of the U.S. delegation. The conference was attended by academicians, magistrates, government officials, and attorneys. Dr. DaRosa presented a paper entitled "Legal and Financial Constraints in the Development of Binational Hydroelectric Plants by Argentina, Brazil, and Paraguay".

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, chaired the session on "Communal Aspects of the American Puritan Experience" at the 13th fall meeting of the Conference on Faith and History at ISU on November 12.

TELEPHONE TIP FOR THE WEEK

The Dimension feature "Call Forwarding" makes it possible to re-route incoming calls to any telephone extension on campus. This allows employees to be away from their desks for a time and still have their phones answered by another station. To initiate this feature, follow these steps:

1. Listen for a dial tone.
2. Dial code "48".
3. Listen for dial tone again.
4. Dial the campus extension number to which calls are to be forwarded ("0" for switchboard).
5. When the confirmation tone is heard, hang up.

ALWAYS notify the office that will be receiving the calls before initiating this feature. To cancel the call forwarding feature, follow these easy steps:

1. Listen for the dial tone.
2. Dial code "58".
3. When confirmation tone is heard, hang up. The feature is cancelled.
