MEDIA CENSORSHIP TO BE PANEL TOPIC

The USI Communications Department will sponsor a panel discussion on media censorship at 6 p.m. Thursday, October 7, in Forum I, with the controversial NYPD Blue television series to be the featured topic.

Dr. Dal Herring, Communication Department chairperson, said a panel of USI professors will discuss internal censorship by the news media such as the decision by WTVW-Channel 7 officials not to air the pilot program in the series. Dr. Herring said they have a copy of the pilot, obtained outside the city, and will show excerpts during the program.

USI, NEW HARMONY HOST INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

The 20th annual meeting of the Communal Studies Association (CSA) and the Israel-based International Communal Studies Association (ICSA) will be held Thursday through Sunday, October 14-17, in New Harmony.

The conference will open with tours and special exhibits. Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, USI professor of history who also is director of the USI Center for Communal Studies and CSA executive director, will discuss the two communal living experiments at New Harmony during the opening dinner session at 7 p.m. Thursday.

The first plenary session at 8 a.m. Friday will feature a discussion on "The Nature and Message of Current Communities," when

Dr. Yaacov Oved of the University of Tel Aviv and ICSA executive director, will speak. Dr. J. Gordon Melton, CSA president and director of the Institute for the Study of American Religions at the University of California in Santa Barbara, will bring the keynote address, "Communal Studies in a Post-Marxist Age," at Friday's dinner meeting.

Dr. Melton became an expert commentator on modern communal living in the U.S. for national news media during the Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms agency/Branch Davidian standoff in Waco, Texas. sity, who became a media commentator on historical communal living during the Waco crisis, will moderate the panel.

Nearly 100 speakers from Australia, Canada, England, Holland, Israel, Japan, Poland, Spain, and the United States will present information on "Culture, Thought, and Living in Community." More than 200 are expected to attend the conference. Discussions will range from the traditional communes of the Shakers, Harmonists, Owenites, and Inspirationists (of Amana, Iowa) to the contemporary settlements of the Kibbutz in Israel, Findhorn in Scotland, and the Hutterite colonies and New Age intentional communities in America.

The conference is dedicated to the memory of **Dr. Karl J. R. Arndt** (1903-1991), Harmony Society scholar and former professor of German at Clark University in Massachusetts. The 1993 CSA Distinguished Scholar Award will be presented to Dr. Arndt posthumously at the Saturday evening dinner. **Dr. Gerhard Friesen**, professor of German at Wilfrid Laurier University in Ontario, will be the keynote speaker.

USI FOUNDATION SUPPORT UP

The USI Foundation has increased it 1993-94 support for faculty development and faculty research by 20 percent. Both programs are administered by **Dr. Robert L. Reid,** vice president for Academic Affairs. Assistance for faculty attending professional and academic meetings will increase from \$21,000 to \$24,000. Support for faculty research, which is awarded by the Faculty Senate, will raise from \$15,000 to \$18,000.

A change also was approved for dissemination of the \$5,000 the USI Foundation commits annually to the Community of Scholars program. Beginning with the 1993-94 program, each school began accruing \$1,000 to be administered by the deans of the separate schools. The accrual will make increased funding available to these programs in the future.

HANDLING UNIVERSITY CASH. Pursuant to the directive of the University president, the only authorized agent to control, account for, and safeguard cash at USI is the Business Office. Specifically, this office is responsible for collecting fees and other income, making all fee refunds, preparing bank deposits, issuing petty cash disbursements, issuing change funds to authorized units, and assessing student fees.

Under no circumstance is an employee to accept money in the name of the University without properly recording the income with an official University receipt. A receipt will be issued by the Cashier's Office for all cash received except for that received by approved satellite operations. Departments that have been approved to accept money are required to issue receipts and make daily deposits, and are responsible for maintaining their own receipt subsidiary records on forms approved by the comptroller.

Any loss of funds should be reported immediately to the Cashier's Office and the University Security Office.
