PROSPECTIVE STUDENT AND PARENT DAY. High school juniors and seniors and their parents will have the opportunity to examine college life at the ISUE Prospective Student and Parent Day on April 14, 1976. Students and parents will meet with Division Chairmen to discuss course requirements and career opportunities for programs offered at ISUE. In addition, interested persons will be encouraged to sit in on classes and observe them in progress on that day. Faculty members are asked to welcome any prospective

students and accompanying parents who attend their classes.

HUMANITIES FORUM. *Daniel Scavone*, Associate Professor of History, will present "The Shroud of Turin: Is This Jesus' Shroud?" on Wednesday, April 14 at 10:00 a.m. in the Rare Books Room. *Dr. Scavone* will discuss the legendary Shroud of Turin, a burial shroud that bears the image of a man whose face is that of the traditional face of Jesus.

The April 20 Humanities Forum will feature *Howard Gabennesch*, Assistant Professor of Sociology, speaking on "The Latest on Marijuana: Godsend, Devil Weed, or Just Another Smoke?" at 11:00 a.m. in the Rare Books Room. *Dr. Gabennesch* will examine the most recent evidence regarding the nature and extent of cannabis use, the possibilities of harmful physiological, psychological, and social effects, and the prospects for decriminalization.

The Humanities Forum is sponsored by the Division of Humanities and is open to the public.

EASTER EGG HUNT. An Easter egg hunt will take place on campus Saturday, April 17, 1976 beginning at 10:00 a.m. Children of ISUE students and employees, up to the age of 10, will hunt for Easter eggs and special prize eggs. Age groups will be divided so all ages will have an opportunity to get lots of eggs. The Easter Bunny will be on campus to hand out prizes and talk with the children.

Plan to bring your children to the first ISUE Easter Egg Hunt. Children should bring their own baskets. The Easter Egg Hunt is being sponsored by the ISUE Student Union Board.

E.R.A. FORUM. An E.R.A. Forum will take place on Wednesday, April 14 at 1:00 p.m. in the Rare Books Room. *Phyllis Elliott*, Campus Minister at Newman Center, U of E, will moderate a panel on the pros and cons of the passage of the E.R.A. bill. *Carol Costa*, President of the League of Women Voters, will present the pro side of the issue, while *Myrna Craney* of Stop E.R.A. will deliver the con side. A question/answer period will follow the panel discussion. The Forum is being sponsored by Campus Ministry. All interested persons are invited to attend.

BICENTENNIAL CONVOCATION. The second session of the Bicentennial Convocation, "The Changing Status of Women," will be presented by Charles Petranek, Assistant Professor of Sociology, on April 14 at 2:00 p.m. in Room 28. Dr. Petranek will be serving as panel moderator with ISUE student, Heather Kerr, and Daniel Scavone, Associate Professor of History. Major topics will be the roles of females today and how they handle these roles; how the women's movement is changing male roles; and why men and women are switching traditional social roles. The convocation is open to the public.

AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM. The featured speaker for the American Issues Forum on Wednesday, April 14 is Charles Bertram, Chairman, Division of Education and Associate Professor of Education and Mathematics. Dr. Bertram will discuss "Education For Work and Life," under the broad topic "Growing Up in America," at 7:30 p.m. in A34. A speaker is presented each Wednesday evening, and the public is invited to attend.

ART EXHIBITS ON CAMPUS. Now on display in the University Center, Room 350, is a show entitled "Fired Clay and Fabrics" by visiting artists, David and Anneke Herrold. The exhibit will be on display through Thursday, April 15. The Herrolds will be on hand to discuss their work on April 15 at 12:30 p.m. in UC350. The exhibit is being sponsored by the Division of Humanities.

David Herrold will also give a ceramic demonstration in the Art Center on April 20 at 1:00 p.m., followed by a 7:00 p.m. lecture, "Living Room Art and Other Popular Images," in the Cafeteria, University Center. Both events will be open to the public.

"The Human Form," an exhibition of sixty-seven drawings from the current figure drawing course, is on exhibit in the Technology Center. "A variety of media has been incorporated by the artists in order to best express their personal attitudes and sensitivity to their drawings," according to Jan Michael Siau, the figure drawing instructor. The show will be up through April 15.

ISUE SECRETARIES CLUB TO MEET. The ISUE Secretaries Club will hold its monthly meeting on Thursday, April 15 from 11:45 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in UC352. There will be no guest speaker, as the meeting is intended for business only. Secretaries planning to attend the meeting may bring their lunch or go through the cafeteria line.

CAREER EDUCATION SEMINAR SERIES. Dr. David Campbell, author of the popular career education-oriented book, "If You Don't Know Where You're Going, You'll Probably End Up Somewhere Else," will be featured in an IHETS program on April 20. The show is part of the Career Education Seminar Series and is open to the public, free of charge. Dr. Campbell will conduct a dialogue on career planning with a group of parents and young people. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m. in Room SC194.

SOUTHERN INDIANA EARTHQUAKE SEMINAR. The Southern Indiana Earthquake Seminar will take place on Wednesday, April 21 from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the Seville Room, Executive Inn. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. followed by opening comments by Mayor Russell G. Lloyd, City of Evansville. The conference is expected to bring government, business, and industrial leaders, engineers, architects and building officials together to hear the latest information on earthquake hazard areas and methods of reducing risks. The seminar is being sponsored by the American Society of Civil Engineers, Indiana Society of Architects, Indiana Society of Professional Engineers, University of Evansville, and Indiana State University Evansville. SPRING NONCREDIT SERIES. Estate Planning and Summer Sailing School are being offered by the Office of Continuing Education in the Spring '76 series of noncredit community service courses. Estate Planning will cover wills, joint ownership, use of gifts, deeds, life insurance, social security, trust, investments, and retirement programs, including the effect of these on federal and state taxation. Instructors for the course are *Bill Leedy*, Instructor in Business; *Michael Mitchell*, Attorney; *David Stinnett*, Special Agent, Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co.; and *Lee Cooper*, Trust Officer, Citizens National Bank. The course will be taught for six weeks, beginning April 21, at 6:30 p.m. in L107. The registration fee is \$35.00 and includes all course materials.

For sailing enthusiasts, an exciting week in intensive instruction, both on shore and in sailboats, will be conducted by *Tom Rivers*, Member U.S. Power Squadron and National San Juan Association, at Kentucky Lake State Park, Aurora, Kentucky. Students will sail the San Juan 21 Mark I and II, a 21 foot cruiser; the *Banshee*, a 13 foot day sailor; and the *Sunflower*, a 12 foot day sailor. Scheduled to begin on May 10, the class will meet for a minimum of six hours per day each day. Additional summer sailing schools can be scheduled on other dates in May and June if sufficient interest is expressed to the Office of Continuing Education. The registration fee is \$90.00.

ISUE COMMUNITY GARDEN PLOTS NOW AVAILABLE. *Charles Petranek*, Assistant Professor of Sociology and Director of the ISUE Community Garden Plots, has announced that the garden plots have been plowed and disced and are now available. "The plots can be rented for \$5.00 per plot until November," comments *Dr. Petranek*. "There are approximately thirty-three plots ready at the present time, and they each measure 40' x 25'."

The plots have been moved to a new location this year southwest of the Technology Center. Water will also be available from a nearby fire hydrant.

All ISUE students, faculty and staff members are eligible to participate in the garden plot project. The rental fee should be paid at the Cashier's Window and the receipt should be taken to *Dr. Petranek's* office, SC166, where a garden plot will be assigned.

DEADLINE FOR PURCHASE REQUISITIONS TO BE CHARGED AGAINST 1975-76 FISCAL YEAR BUDGET. The Purchasing Office will accept Purchase Requisitions for the 1975-76 fiscal year until the following dates:

1. Bid and written quotation items - May 1, 1976
 - A. Bid items or items which total \$5,000 or more.
 - B. Written quotation items or items which total \$300 - \$4,999.
2. Purchase Requisitions for other items - May 31, 1976.

The above deadlines are necessary to allow the Purchasing Department enough time to complete the processing of the purchase requisitions and issue the purchase orders prior to the end of the fiscal year, July 1, 1976. All purchase requisitions received after May 31, 1976 will be applied to the 1976-77 fiscal year budget and the purchase orders will be distributed to the departments and vendors on or as soon as possible after July 1, 1976.
