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USI EXHIBIT SLATED FOR STATE FAIR. USI will be participating in the State University Exhibit at the Indiana State Fair this year for the first time. Several staff members have volunteered to work at the USI booth during the fair, August 14-25. August 19 will be Collegiate Day at the fair and discounts will be offered to students, faculty, staff, alumni, and prospective students of USI. If you attend the fair that day and register at the USI booth, you will receive an ID bracelet entitling you to free shuttle bus rides and two-for-one discounts on tickets for harness racing and for the Neil Young concert at 8 p.m. in the grandstand.

USI Day at the fair will be Friday, August 23, with concerts slated at 11 a.m. and 1 and 3 p.m. by the Mid-America Singers under the direction of Mrs. Sue Schriber.

NEW CAMPUS MINISTRY STAFF IN PLACE. Father Anthony B. Kissel, new director of Campus Ministry and philosophy lecturer, and Ms. Leslie A. Shiel, a second minister and coordinator of communications, have joined the University family, succeeding Father Bernard Lutz.

Father Kissel and Ms. Shiel have been at the Newman Center at the University of Evansville and plan to set up combined programs for the two universities. Ms. Shiel will develop a joint newsletter, Newman Connections. In addition to developing student religious life programs on campus, Father Kissel lives at 8134-A O'Daniel Lane and will be resident advisor in the student housing. He will work with Mr. Robert Harper, director of student counseling, to develop community spirit and peer support programs at MASH, and retreats for student advisors.

Father Kissel said he expects to maintain office hours four days a week, but will be available seven days a week since he lives at MASH. Ms. Shiel will be on campus 32 hours a week, in addition to teaching freshman composition classes.

Father Kissel was at Mater Dei High School prior to joining the Newman Center staff seven years ago; he now is president of the Indiana Newman Foundation, which provides support for colleges and universities. Ms. Shiel, of 916 SE Second Street, has been at the UE Newman Center a year.

Also working with them at USI will be Mrs. Katherine Fuchs, who formerly was a secretary in the USI Division of Science and Mathematics for two years. She now is Father Kissel's secretary with the Newman Foundation and will spend two days a week in the USI offices. She and her husband, Gilbert, live at 3320 N. Red Bank Road. They have five children.

Mr. Stephen Birmingham, who made publishing history by having two books on The New York Times bestseller list at the same time, will deliver the keynote address for the Ohio River Writers' Conference, which will be held Friday through Sunday, August 2-4, in the University Conference Center. Birmingham will speak at the conference banquet at 6 p.m. Friday and also lead workshops on non-fiction writing.

The public is being invited to the banquet and the public readings which will be led Friday at 8 p.m. by non-fiction author Ms. Andrea Darvi, and Saturday at 8 p.m. by poet Ms. Rita Dove and fiction writer Mr. Michael Martone. The three also will lead workshops in their fields. Other participants will include Mr. Peter Jacobi, professor of journalism at Indiana University, in a Public Relations Forum; Ms. Jane Jordan Browne, a Chicago literary agent with advice on product marketing; and state and local authors -- Mr. Gary Devon, Ms. Jo Frohbieter-Mueller, Ms. Maggie Greenwood-Robinson, Ms. Sandra Hermann, Ms. Rebecca Carson Kelley, Mrs. Marilyn Kluger, Ms. Ann Stuart, and Father Joseph Ziliak -- who will lead topic workshops.
