Feast at Christmas Madrigal

A Christmas Madrigal Feast will be presented by the USI Mid-America Singers on December 5-8. The Feast is to be held in the USI dining center.

A Madrigal is a pastoral song in which two or more voices sing separate melodies to a simple text. It

usually has no instrumental accompaniment. Madrigal originated in Italy in the late 1200's, with the form reaching its high point in the early 1600's.

Foods served for the feast will be wassail—the traditional drink—Beef and barley soup, cranberry salad, Baran of Beef du jois, Yorkshire pudding, green

beans and twice baked potato. Plum pudding is the traditional dessert.

The festivities start with the Trumpeter's Fanfare, continue with the Lord's Fanfare, the procession, and the Wassail Fanfare.

The Chamberlain will be played by Micheal Boenigk. The Lord of the

manor is Jack Schriber, with Suzanne Schreiber as his lady. Judy Beck, Chris Reiner will be wenches, with Bruce Bennet, Steve Mohler, and Brad Oliver being jesters. Acrobats will be Jim Bauer, Paul Brenner, Allyson Chew, Fred Evans, Laura Gries, Rachel Hayden, Mike Pruitt and Alan Woodruff. Micheal Embrey will be the pauper, with the pages being Darin Hunt, David Tanner and Tiffany Shriber.

Music will be provided by trumpeters Joe Coffman and Steve Mohler. Harpsichord will be played by David Anners, and Recorders by Steve Mohler and Brad Oliver.

Both Madrigals and Carols will be sung during the feast. Some of the Madrigals sung are, "We Come A-Caroling", "O Care Thou Wilt Despatch me", "Je t'aime", and others. "The Babe of Bethlehem", "Canon for Christmas Eve", "I'm Stall", and "Puer Nobis" are a few of the Carols to be presented.

Suzanne Schriber is in charge of musical direction with Jack Schrober being director of the Madrigals. Roberta Schweizer and Dorothy Rice are in charge

of tickets. Jane Behagg was responsible for the beautiful medieval costumes worn by the singers.

Halley's comet can be seen through high powered binoculars in the southwestern sky as a small fuzzy ball.

During its trek past Earth, the comet will become more visible during the early part of December, late March, again during the first part of April, and then again in the year 2060.

Scientists agree the comet will not be as exciting as its sighting in 1910 but it will still be fascinating to witness a big ball of dirty ice flying in the dark sky with a tail more than a million miles long.

There are those who will not allow themselves time to look for the comet and see a sight most likely will not be seen again by a majority of us.

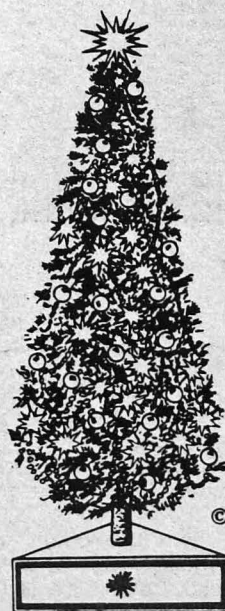

Plan to come to spend a relaxed, Christmas shopping day away from the hustle and bustle of the big cities.



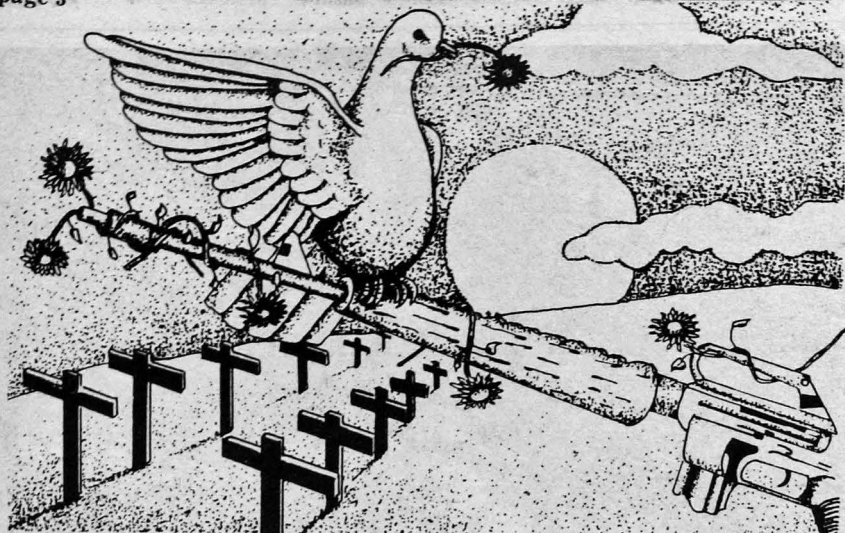
The Teddy Bears are on parade at Eastland Mall.

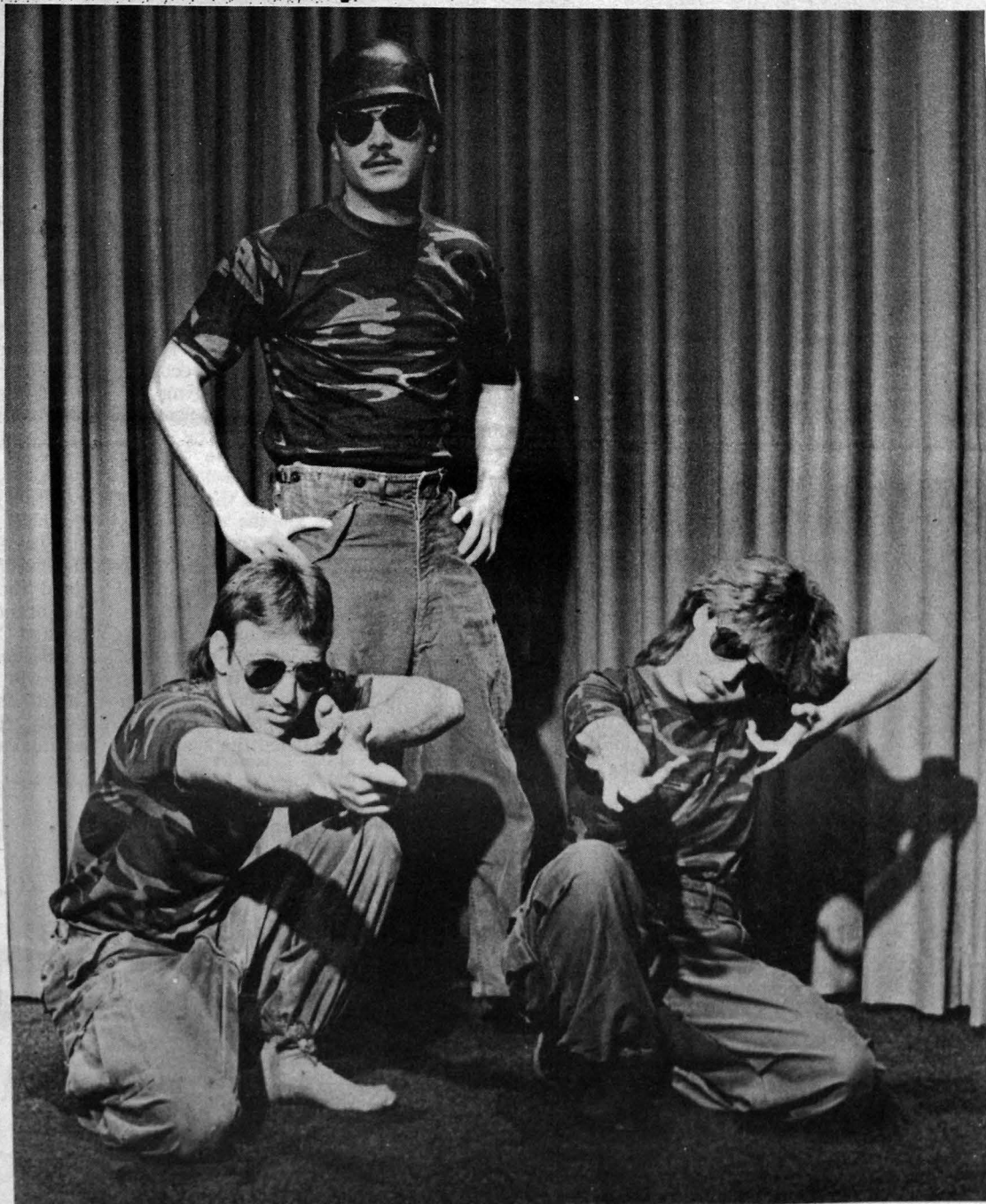
Students at the University of Southern Indiana will present "Tug of Peace," a compilation of literature, music, and dance, as a holiday benefit for the Tri-State Food Bank.

The Christmas gift drive is not new to Vanderburgh County residents. Each year the Mental Health Association collects gifts for Evansville State Hospital patients as well as those in nursing homes and other healthcare facilities. The Christmas Gift-Lift is aimed at providing a personalized gift for each patient who otherwise might not be remembered during the holiday season.

Drop boxes for gift donations are located at all Hook's Drug Stores as well as area banks and businesses. Call the Mental Health Association for the location nearest to you.

Many hospital residents rely entirely on the MHA to provide a "Christmas" for them. About 50% of the chronically ill patients have no family or friends or little

contact with existing families. Some residents' families would like to visit but cannot afford trips to Evansville or to buy and send Christmas gifts.

Bethel Temple Presents "Living Christmas Tree"

Nearly three stories tall, with the Bethel Temple choir members becoming living and singing ornaments telling the story of Christmas — that's Bethel Temple's unique "Living Christmas Tree."

It will be the result of many months of work by the Bethel Temple Choir and many volunteers under the direction of Minister of Music, Teresa Patchin. Leon McLaughlin and his crew were in charge of building the frame seven years ago and the Bethel Temple Lighting Committee designed the system of

2500 lights for the tree. Live, fireproofed pine branches will be arranged on each of the 9 tiers and decorated with lively velvet bows, and approximately 150 ornaments, and 450 ft. of garland. It will be topped by a five foot high star that reaches toward the sanctuary's ceiling. Members of the church's adult choir will blend their voices among the branches in the program of Christmas music.

Bethel Temple's living tree will be the church's Christmas gift to the community. The church's 2,000 seating capacity will make

it possible for thousands of people to view the memorable performances at Christmas this year. The "Living Christmas Tree" has become an annual Tri-State tradition, with this being its seventh year.

This special ballet is presented in numerous cities across the nation every December, always delighting Christmas audiences. Many families celebrate the yuletide season by attending this

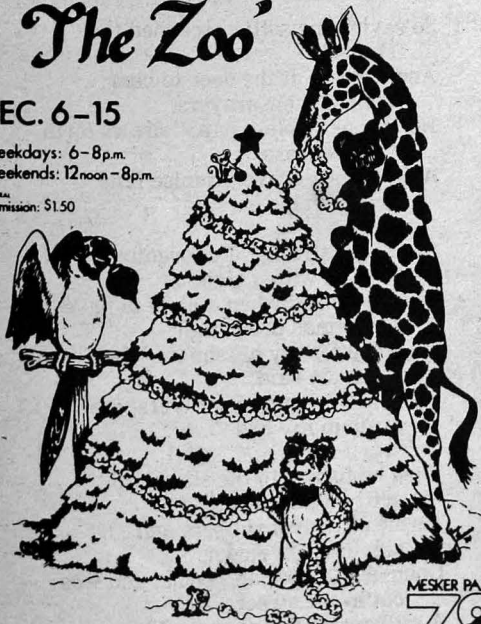
traditional entertainment event each year. There is no better way to capture the wonder and fantasy of the Christmas season than to see the magical performance of "The Nutcracker".

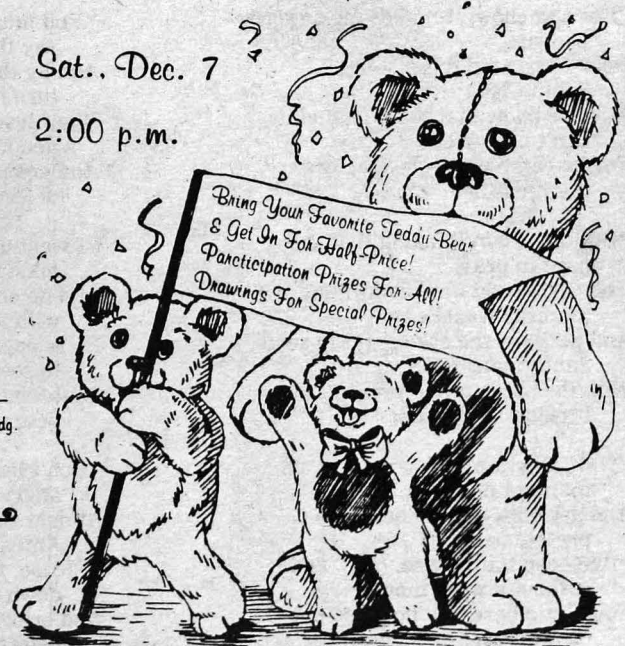

Season's Greetings, Merry Christmas

A week from today, Finals will be over and you will be able to turn your attention to more important things — Christmas. To help put you in the mood and maybe give you some ideas to celebrate the Holiday, I went on a quest for Christmas.

There are very few if any countries that do not celebrate the birth of the Christ Child in some manner, in the U.S. it's Christmas, *Kerst Misse* in Holland, *Noel* in France, *Il Natale* in Italy and *Weihnachten* in Germany.

Much of what we consider part of the traditional American Christmas (Christmas trees, Santa Claus, etc.) was imported from other countries. Santa Claus's name for instance could very easily have come from the Dutch, *Sinter Krass*, and the custom of having a Christmas tree was imported from Germany. The first Christmas tree on record was, "raised in Strassburg in 1604". Up until this time, Yule Logs had been burned with much pomp and ceremony, and served as the center of the Holiday festivities. Growing towns and fewer fireplaces however proved to be the downfall of the custom of the Yule Log, except in some very traditional homes, but even they will now sport a Christmas Tree.

Another Christmas tradition dear to my heart and I am sure yours, has to do with what's cooking in the kitchen. Places like Denmark, Bulgaria and even the United States have a fondness for a Christmas goose at mealtime. If you lived in Czechoslovakia, you would have a Christmas carp. One delicacy of

Christmas in Costa Rica is the roast *Tepisquintle*, "a cross between a wild hog and a glorified rat" as reported by the *Panama Times* of Dec. 26, 1925. More to your liking would probably be the plum pudding from England and Ginger Bread from Germany; not to mention your mother's favorite cookie and cake recipies.

Another part of Christmas has to do with myths and old wives' tales. For instance, did you know the Scottish believe that people born on Christmas can see ghosts? The French believe these same people have the gift of prophecy.

The main thing I found on my quest is that Christmas is a joyous time whether you observe it as a purely religious Holy Day or as a secular holiday. It is a special time to be with Family and Friends.
