IU vice president to give Berger Lecture

Controversy about the image of a Ku Klux Klan cross burning in one of Thomas Hart Benton's Indiana history murals will be the topic of the 2003 Sydney Berger Lecture by Dr. Charles Nelms, vice president for Student Development and Diversity at Indiana University Bloomington.

Nelms will present "Art, Diversity, or Censorship: Who Decides?" at 7:30 p.m. March 27 in Carter Hall. The program is free and open to the public.

Benton painted the mural series for the State of Indiana exhibit at the 1933 Chicago World's Fair. Since 1941, the controversial scene has been permanently displayed in Woodburn 100, a lecture hall on the Bloomington campus.

According to a description by author Kathleen Foster, the mural shows tiny figures robed in white at the center distance, where a burning cross stands against a dark sky. Here, the KKK gathers between a church (St. Charles Catholic Church in Peru, Ind.) and a raised flag.

The flag represents the forces of Protestantism and patriotism that fronted a national White Supremacist Movement in the 1920s. Victory over the Klan seems secure in the vignette at the center, where a white nurse tends both black and white children. The press, in the foreground, is represented by a reporter, a photographer, and a printer.

Nelms has been at IU Bloomington since 1998. His 30-year career in higher education includes work in academic affairs, student development, and enrollment management for private and public universities.

The focus of his scholarly and research activities includes college access and degree attainment for African Americans and other underrepresented groups. He established the Interracial Communications Project at four urban universities to explore the causes and consequences of racism in America.

Nelms' work in quality improvement in higher education and accreditation has taken him to South Africa, Japan, the United Arab Emirates, and the United Kingdom. He was a contributor to the book, *Grass Roots and Glass Ceilings: African American Administrators in Predominately White Universities*.

The Sydney Berger Lecture is an annual event sponsored by the USI School of Liberal Arts to honor the memory of Sydney Berger, one of Evansville's most prominent attorneys and an instructor in constitutional law at USI. Because of Berger's commitment to individual liberty, the theme of the lecture program relates to civil rights or liberties.

The 2003 Berger Lecture committee includes Dr. Hilary Braysmith, associate professor of art history; Leonard Dowhie, professor of art; and Joan Kempf, assistant professor of graphic design.

Disabilities expert presenting FDR program

The director of Ball State University's Disabled Student Development Office - who has made presentations with Nina Roosevelt Gibson, Franklin Delano Roosevelt's granddaughter - will share the program with the community Thursday, March 6, at USI.

In conjunction with the University's celebration of Diversity Week, Richard Harris will present "Franklin D. Roosevelt: Elected In Spite Of or Because Of His Disability" from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in Mitchell Auditorium.

With very few exceptions, FDR's biographers have underplayed or completely ignored the polio-caused paralysis he contracted in 1921. In his program, Harris combines a longtime interest in FDR with his knowledge of disability issues.

Utilizing slides of extremely rare photographs of FDR - including the only two known shots of him in a wheelchair - Harris will explore FDR's life and political career before and after the onset of disability.

He also will examine the effect of FDR's disability on Eleanor Roosevelt and will ask the questions: Was FDR elected in spite of or because of his disability; was FDR's close relationship with the press helpful or harmful; and could a severely-disabled person be elected president today?

The program also will consider FDR's handling of disability as a precursor to the way society deals with disability today, and it will consider where the nearly 50-million Americans with disabilities fit into the social fabric.

Harris has directed Ball State's Disabled Student Development Office for 28 years and has been a disability advocate at local, state, and national levels. He also is a founder of the Association on Higher Education and Disability, and twice served as the organization's president.

The USI Counseling Center, Office of Student Development Programs, Multicultural Center, and Student Affairs Staff Development Committee are sponsoring the presentation.

"Franklin D. Roosevelt: Elected In Spite Of or Because Of His Disability" is free and open to the public. A reception will follow.

Harris will present a second two-hour program for University faculty and staff Friday, March 7. "From FDR to Jerry Lewis: America's Confused Relationship with Disability; Where does USI Fit In?" will begin at 10 a.m. in Room 2018 of the Orr Center.

Achievements

Dr. Robert L. Reid, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, was recognized for a lifetime of contributions by the Academic Leadership and Change Division of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities February 8. With 28 years of service, Reid participated in the initial planning meeting for the division in 1974 and has been an active member serving in numerous capacities including Indiana liaison, member of the National Advisory Committee, national mentor for the Academic Leadership Academy, and workshop leader and presenter at numerous annual meetings.
