COACH JOHN WOODEN TO SPEAK AT ISUE. John Wooden, who compiled a record as the winningest coach in all of basketball's history as the head coach of UCLA's basketball program, will speak in the Forum, February 21 at 8:00 p.m.

Wooden's visit to Evansville will be sponsored by the Student Union Board, and his speech will be open to the public at no charge.

A native Hoosier, Wooden was born in Martinsville and attended Martinsville High School and Purdue University where he received outstanding honors in basketball. He coached sports at South Bend Central High School and later served at Indiana State as athletic director, basketball and baseball coach for two seasons before joining UCLA.

Under Wooden, UCLA gained a world-wide reputation of being number one. At the conclusion of his 27th season as coach of the Bruins, Wooden's team registered 620 wins against 147 setbacks and far more national honors than any other university. UCLA won an unprecedented 10 NCAA Championships in 12 seasons, including seven which were consecutive. At the conclusion of his 40th year as a head coach, his 885-win, 203-loss mark (.813%) was unequaled.

FREE LECTURE SERIES ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROBLEMS. John Schuster, a representative from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will be the first speaker in a free lecture series entitled Environmental Problems and Solutions to be held on campus this semester. He will speak at 7:00 p.m. Thursday, February 2 in Room 34 of the Administration Building.

A different speaker will be featured each Thursday evening at 7:00 p.m. in the series which will address the major problems of the area such as pollution of the Ohio River, water treatment, air pollution, nuclear energy, and strip mine reclamation. A well-balanced program of environmental specialists and representatives from industry is planned.
