**ENERGY CONSERVATION.** Southern Indiana Gas and Electric Company and other utility companies in the nation are currently under an Emergency Energy Control Plan. With less than a 40-day coal supply on hand, and with tentative coal negotiations and ratification procedures in process, all businesses, institutions, industries, homes and other energy utilizers are asked to effect a voluntary electricity load reduction of 25%.

Continued and stepped-up energy conservation actions on the part of each of us is necessary to contribute to the load reduction. All efforts should be exerted to maintain reduced lighting, to turn off lights, to reduce air laboratory circulation and air exhaust exchanges, to keep all doors closed, and to carry out other energy-saving techniques.

Such steps will delay the date that a 50% mandatory load reduction would take effect under the Emergency Energy Control Plan, resulting in a number of mandatory curtailment efforts.

**"WOMEN IN GOVERNMENT."** Marilou Wertzler, Reporter for the Indiana State Supreme Court and Court of Appeals, will keynote the second and final segment of the "Women in Government" program at ISUE on Thursday, February 9 at 7:30 p.m. in Room 350 of the University Center.

Wertzler's address, "A Woman's Place . . ." will carry out the theme of the "Women in Government" program, which stresses that a woman's place is in the house, the senate, the mayor's office and other governmental posts. Prior to being elected to office, Wertzler served in Republican party positions including Vice Chairperson of the Delaware County Republican Party. She also has worked in senatorial and presidential campaigns and served as an alternate delegate to the 1972 and 1976 Republican National Convention.

The program will be moderated by Lillian Carnaghi representing the Vanderburgh County Republican women's organization.

The "Psychology of Women in Government" will be discussed by JANET K. WYATT, Instructor in Psychology and "The Philosophy of Women in Government" will be discussed by Frances Dodson Rhome, Associate Professor of English Literature and Director of Affirmative Action at Indiana University.

Following the keynote address by Wertzler, the issue of women being appointed to positions in government will be discussed by a panel composed of Robert Brenner, Chairperson of the Vanderburgh County Democratic Party; Bettye Lou Jerrel, Chairperson of the Vanderburgh County Republican Party; and Evansville Mayor Russell G. Lloyd.

The reactor panel will be composed of Dolores Kase, League of Women Voters and ISUE student; Mattie Miller, Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority; Maggie Reimann, Evansville Area Local Postal Workers' Union Auxiliary; and DR. HELEN SANDS, Associate Professor of Communications.

Following the program, a reception open to all in attendance will be held in the University Center.
