KOCH FELLOWSHIP. Dr. Ernest H. Hall, Jr., assistant professor of management and director of the Small Business Institute, has been selected as the 1994 Malcolm Koch Fellow. The selection was based on Dr. Hall's research proposal, "Reintegrating Horizontal and Vertical Diversification: A New Conceptual and Empirical Framework." The fellowship provides a \$5,500 stipend, assistance of a student worker for up to 20 hours a week for 10 weeks between spring and fall semesters, and freedom from summer classes.

The Koch fellowship is awarded annually to encourage scholarship and to make time available for concentrated research activities. Dr. Jong Rhim, assistant professor of economics, was the first recipient in 1993.
