PARKING PROBLEMS. The campus typically is "overparked" during the first two weeks of the fall semester. Faculty, staff, and students are encouraged to carpool or to ride the METS bus. Students in student housing are encouraged to walk or to ride the "campus shuttle vans," which will make continuous 15-minute round trips through the campus and student housing between 7:45 a.m. and 1:45 p.m. Monday through Friday, August 29-September 9.

The first METS "Eagle Express" leaves the downtown Sixth-and-Sycamore transfer site at 7:15 a.m. and arrives at USI at 7:55. The Eagle Express runs hourly through the last run at 4:15 p.m. The regular METS fare of 50 cents, plus 10 cents per transfer, is charged. Pickups are made along the Expressway/Indiana 62; suggested locations are Fulton and St. Joseph avenues and Red Bank and Boehne Camp roads.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, presented a paper for the August 14 "Science Weekend" program of the American Psychological Association in Atlanta. "Recall With Pictorial Versus Verbal Time Compression" involved a comparison of accelerated simple lecturelike narration at 430 words per minute, in contrast to an equivalent series of enactments with an information content equivalent to 430 w.p.m. Rapid presentation theoretically minimized mental imagery and verbalization during study. Delayed pictorial recall after distraction was more than twice that of verbal recall and at a retention level of more than 30 sentences of information per study minute.

Dr. Charles F. Petranek, chairman of the Department of Sociology, spoke Tuesday, August 23, at a seminar at Medco Center, Mount Vernon, on "Understanding Grieving."

Dr. Munir Quddus, assistant professor of economics, is the senior author of a paper recently accepted for publication by the Journal of Macroeconomics. Co-authors of the paper, entitled "Money, Prices, and Causality: The Chinese Hyperinflation, 1945-49, Re-examined," are **Dr. J. S. Butler** of Vanderbilt University and **Dr. Jin Tan Liu** of National Cheng Chi University.

ICLU ANNUAL MEETING. Indiana Supreme Court **Chief Justice Randall T. Shepard**, formerly of Evansville, will be the keynote speaker at the Indiana Civil Liberties Union annual meeting to be held Saturday, September 17, at the Indiana University School of Law, Indianapolis. Justice Shepard will speak at a 7 p.m. dinner meeting in the Indiana Sports Center, with a reception to follow in Canterbury Hotel. His address, "Civil Liberties Protections in the Indiana Constitution," will be the culmination of

a series of seminars during the day dealing with civil liberties issues in the work place -- sexual discrimination, the "hire and fire at will" doctrine, privacy, and drug testing. For information and tickets, contact **Dr. Walter Hopkins**, USI professor of sociology, extension 1723 or 479-5107.

EVENTS. A centerpiece attraction for Hoosier Celebration '88 will be the Indiana Statehouse Centennial Celebration on Saturday, September 3, in Indianapolis. There will be public tours of the restored Statehouse and a major festival on the surrounding grounds. The original decor was refurbished during the Goodrich Administration, 1917-21, with Victorian wall designs painted over in favor of a Neoclassical scheme. In the current restoration, some four acres of plaster walls and ceilings were stripped and repainted with original designs. Among other work, the stained glass dome in the rotunda has been cleaned and restored and will be illuminated by high-intensity lights and a reflective fabric structure; 40 original brass chandeliers were restored, 67 have been replicated; and four sets of monumental oak entrance doors -- each 4' by 13' and weighing 600 pounds -- were restored, four sets replicated.

"National Parks Day" will be observed Thursday, August 25, when visitors will have free admission to all fee-charging parks in the National Park System. The National Park Service is authorized to provide one free day annually and has selected the anniversary date of the service. Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial will mark the observance with the film, "Challenge of Yellowstone," designed to foster better understanding of national parks; it will be shown at 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.
