DNA EXHIBIT IS SHOWN AT MUSEUM. One of the most ambitious and popular exhibits ever presented by the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science has returned to the museum through February 9. "DNA: The Blueprint of Life" consists of 14 teaching units with emphasis on discovery, development and exploration of the DNA molecule. The exhibit was developed by Dr. Marlene Shaw, associate professor of life science, who is on sabbatical this year. Several ISUE faculty and staff supported Dr. Shaw's development of the exhibit, which was viewed by about 15,000 visitors when it first appeared at the museum in 1982.

FINANCIAL AID WORKSHOP. The ISUE Office of Financial Aids and Admissions Office will present the Third Annual Tri-State Financial Aid Workshop on Sunday, February 5 in Forum One of the Administration Building. The program will explain various sources of financial aid for students planning to attend college during the next academic year. Personal confidential help will also be available to persons needing assistance completing the federal Financial Aid Form (FAF) which must be filed by March 1 (with a recommended date of February 15). FREEZE-A-THON IS FEBRUARY 10. Freezing is an exercise used in acting classes in which two people begin an improvisational routine and continue until a classmate sees an opportunity to begin a new scene. For twelve hours beginning Friday, February 10 at 1:00 p.m., ISUE theatre students will employ this technique in their second Freeze-a-thon.
