

Berger Lecture to feature religion in schools debate

Two Hoosier attorneys will be featured in a debate on "Religion and the Public Schools" at 7 p.m. Thursday, February 26, in Mitchell Auditorium. The program will make up the 1998 Sydney Berger Lecture and will feature **Mr. Patrick A. Shoulders** of Evansville and **Mr. John R. Price** of Indianapolis. **Mr. John Dobken**, news anchor at Channel 44, will serve as moderator. A reception will follow the debate, which is free and open to the public.

The annual program honors an Evansville attorney who died in 1988 after many years representing labor and the NAACP, among many others in the city. He also had taught Constitutional law for nearly 20 years at USI and was the recipient

of the Evansville Bar Association's James Bethel Gresham Freedom Award.

Mr. Shoulders is a member of the law firm of Ziemer, Stayman, Weitzel & Shoulders, which specializes in litigation, health, media, and education law. He is attorney for the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers, past president of the Evansville Bar Association and recipient of its Freedom Award, and an active member at various levels of the bar association. His numerous community activities have included director of the Arts Fest

Exercise physiologist to speak

Dr. Glenn Gaesser, an exercise physiologist and author of *Big Fat Lies: The Truth About Your Weight and Your Health*, will be a guest lecturer at 7 p.m. Wednesday, February 25, in Carter Hall, in an observance of National Eating Disorders Awareness Week, February 23-28.

Dr. Gaesser questions the popular beliefs about body weight and health and the thin-at-any-price mentality, offering the view that lifestyle factors are far more important than body weight and that people can be fit no matter what they weigh. In a recent article in Wellness Management, a newsletter of the National

Wellness Association, he wrote, "If we accept the fact that fit and healthy bodies come in many shapes and sizes, and that improved well-being can be attained by eating a healthy diet and becoming more physically active, then the message becomes much simpler: Eat well, exercise more, and don't be obsessed with the numbers on the bathroom scale."

Dr. Gaesser, an associate professor of exercise physiology and associate director of the adult fitness program at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville, believes this theory is a more compassionate and tolerant view of body weight and may have a markedly more positive effect on lifetime wellness.

Two USI grants approved

The Indiana Partnership for Statewide Education (IPSE) Working Group has approved two distance learning course development grants for USI.

The group recommended distribution of \$10,962 to support the Internet delivery of HP411 Health Care Systems Management, a key component of the school's Health Services baccalaureate degree program. **Dr. Carol J. Hermes**, Health Services program director, will teach the course and collaborate on its development with **Dr. Judith A. Halstead**, the school's coordinator of Distance Education and director of the Day Learning Resource Center.

The IPSE Working Group also approved \$6,818 to support the multimedia development of JRN 384 Feature Writing, a course offered by the Communications Department. **Mr. Ronald C. Roat,** coordinator for the department's Journalism and Computer Publishing sequences,
