## BOARD REVIEWS BUILDING PLANS

The USI Board of Trustees reviewed and tentatively approved plans for a new Health Professions Building at a meeting January 9 in Indianapolis. The plans were presented by Odle, McGuire & Shook Corporation, the architectural firm that designed the building. Dr. Joseph E. O'Daniel, chairman, appointed a committee of Board members to review final plans and make approvals on behalf of the Board before their next scheduled meeting in March.

Bonding authorization for \$14.5 million was received from the state legislature last

year. The three-level building, expected to be completed in December 1993, will have general classrooms, instructional laboratories, medical education laboratories, faculty offices, and a dental clinic. The facility will house the USI School of Nursing and Health Professions and the IU School of Medicine-Evansville Center.

Groundbreaking for the Health Professions Building, to be located north of and connected to the Science Center, is planned this summer. Board members discussed interim financing for the building, then approved financing \$9 million of the cost through Fifth Third Bank of Central Indiana.

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In other business, the Board approved a new Master of Science in Education, Elementary Education, program designed to provide elementary teachers with a foundation of advanced study in teaching and learning techniques. Chairman O'Daniel called the approval of the degree program an important element in the University's ability to serve southern Indiana. The program will be submitted to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for approval. Pending that approval, the program could be implemented in the fall semester, 1992.

Festivities will begin at 7 p.m. with cocktails (German cocktail wine and hors d'oeuvres). Dinner at 7:30 will be prepared by Petroleum Club chefs and will include a French course (grilled whole quail); Australian course (grilled rack of lamb); Alsatian course (filet of sole); Spanish course (grilled breast of chicken); and Portuguese course (Belgian chocolate pate).

The wines were selected first, then chefs chose recipes to complement them. Mr. Robert Hurt of Seagram Chateau and Estate Wines Co. and Mr. Michael Pyle of National Wine and Spirits Corporation will entertain diners with their expert commentary on the evening's wines and cuisine.

A silent auction will occur throughout the evening, with a live

auction to follow dinner. Mr. Hugh Miller of Curran Miller Auction & Realty Co. will auction vintage wines, gourmet dinners, wine and cheese baskets, the celebrity services of Mr. James Palermo, manager of the Evansville Philharmonic and popular chef, and the piece d'occasion -- a four-day, three-night stay in San Franciso and the California wine country.

The custom trip for two, a \$1,500 value, may be taken any time during 1992. It includes a USAir flight to San Francisco for a night's lodging in one of the first-class boutique hotels near Union Square, then two nights in either the John Muir Inn in Napa Valley or the Wine Way Inn in Calistoga, plus an economy rental car with unlimited mileage for three days. Haynie Travel is arranging the hotel package and the National Wine and Spirits Corporation will arrange special tours and wine tastings at the Charles Krug and Beringer wineries.

TIAA/CREF RATES. The TIAA Board of Trustees voted dividends in November for TIAA payout annuities for the 12 months beginning January 1. The scale will reduce the applicable rate from 11.5 to 11 percent for annuity income on funds applied to TIAA prior to 1986, and from 9 to 8.75 percent on funds applied during 1986-87; annuity income from post-1987 funds will remain at 1991 levels. While this is an overall reduction, due to ongoing declines in prevailing interest rates, the 11 percent rate is among the highest being paid by any major pension provider.
