UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA
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BUSINESS EDUCATION CONFERENCE. The first annual Conference for Business Education will be held Tuesday, September 1, in the University Center, co-sponsored by the USI Division of Business and South-Western Publishing Company. The theme will be "Focus '87 Teaching for the Information Age." **Dr. Larry Arp**, USI associate professor of business, is chairman of the conference. Participants will include **Dr. Kenneth Settle**, chairman of the Division of Business; **Dr. Charles Bertram**, chairman of the Division of Education; **Mr. John Deem**, USI registrar who will represent the Evansville/Vanderburgh County School Board; **Mr. Jerry Skaggs**, district sales manager for South-Western; **Ms. Betty Pierce**, South-Western consultant; **Mr. Greg Getter**, South-Western marketing manager; **Mr. John O'Bryan**, Office Systems representative; and **Ms. Joni Matthews**, Xerox Corporation marketing executive.

STATE GRANT APPROVED FOR BROCHURE. Confirmation has been received from Lieutenant Governor John Mutz that the USI Foundation has been awarded a State Tourism Information and Promotion Fund grant of \$2,691 to assist in the publication of a promotional brochure for Southern Indiana historical sites. The brochure has been developed as part of a marketing plan of a new group, the Historic Southern Indiana Alliance, formed this past year with USI assistance. The group includes National Park Service sites at Lincoln City and Vincennes; state historic sites in Corydon, New Albany, New Harmony, Angel Mounds, Vincennes, and Madison; the new "Young Abe Lincoln" amphitheater; superintendents of adjoining state parks, representatives of regional tourism associations, and convention and visitors' bureaus; and members of the USI faculty and administrative staff. The group has adopted four purposes: creating a sense of regional identity among participants and residents; using the distinctive historic assets of the region as a marketing vehicle; forming a clearinghouse for educational programs and marketing strategies; and identifying and utilizing the resources of USI and other agencies to enhance the services and programs at the various sites. The first phase of the program is limited to traditionally defined historic sites, due to financial limitation and the desire to establish sound conceptual and organizational foundations. It is anticipated that the group will branch out in the future to include regional historic communities and attractions.

The PAC and pool will observe normal University holidays. All USI students; employees/families; Alumni Association/families; Varsity Club, All-American, Regal, Golden,

and Silver Eagle members/families; and USI Foundation donors of \$100 or more and families will be admitted at no charge with respective IDs. Families include spouses and children, age 18 and under. Fees for the general public will be \$20 a month, with a three-month minimum required; a PAC 'n Pool Pass will be issued as ID. Each of these groups may have a maximum of two guests per visit, at no charge. Equipment may be checked out at the PAC counter by depositing an ID. Lockers, locks, and towels may be obtained at the PAC counter for a \$4 refundable deposit; no deposit required for University employees and families.
