**OPEN HOUSE SET.** Musical performances, dramatic readings, scientific exhibits, pioneer crafts and athletic contests are among the many activities planned for Open House Sunday, October 16 from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m.

Every academic division will be participating in Open House through exhibits and presentations by faculty and students. Hours for the Sunday Buffet have been extended for this day with serving from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Several student organizations are participating with tables and exhibits in the Pyramid Lounge. AMIGOS and the Office of Admissions will conduct tours of the campus for interested persons, and a London double-decker bus, courtesy of Royal Super Foods, will transport guests to the Bent Twig and Westwood Lodge areas. At the Paul Grimes Log Haus, homemade apple butter will simmer over a log fire, prepared by former State Senator Harry Thompson and the Secretaries of ISUE, in the tradition of early settlers. Members of the Westwood Garden Club, which supervised restoration of the 2-story log structure, will act as hostesses in the area, answering questions about the restoration.

At 2:00 and 3:00 p.m., the Mid America Singers, under the direction of Dr. Jon Carlson, will perform their happy songs and energetic choreography in Room A-126.

Books, articles, poetry and other publications of faculty and staff of ISUE will be exhibited by the Archives in the Library. Several other exhibits will be displayed in the Library, including microfilm machines displaying significant newspaper headlines as far back as the 1850s.

The Screaming Eagles of ISUE will scrimmage at Central Arena from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. and intramural football will be played on the intramural field on campus.

**FOURTH ANNUAL HISTORIC COMMUNAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE.** DR. DONALD E. PITZER, Professor of History, will direct the fourth annual Historic Communal Societies Conference at Aurora, Oregon October 20-22, 1977. This conference is sponsored by the National Historic Communal Societies Association of which Dr. Pitzer is president, and the ISUE Center for Communal Studies, which was established in 1976. The conference location is the site of a nineteenth century German colony under the leadership of Dr. William Keil. The members of this community had earlier set up a commune at Bethel, Missouri. Many of the members had split off the Harmony Society of Father George Rapp and had lived at New Harmony, Indiana between 1814 and 1824. The first Historic Communal Societies Conference was held in New Harmony in 1974. DR. CHARLES PETRANEK, Associate Professor of Sociology, who is treasurer of N.H.C.S.A., will also be attending the Oregon conference.

**HUMANITIES FORUM.** A slide show and narration on the works of Andrew Wyeth will be introduced by RAMONA STAMETS, Associate Professor of Art at the Humanities Forum Tuesday, October 18 at 10:00 a.m. in SC-191. Although the presentation is titled "The World of Andrew Wyeth," Mrs. Stamets says it probably should be called "The Two Main Worlds of Andrew Wyeth" because it covers the two richest periods of his life. The first period is when he lived in Pennsylvania at Chad's Ford on Duerner's Farm and the second period is in New England at Olson's Farm in Cushing, Maine. Wyeth's paintings of scenes in Pennsylvania and New England have universal appeal because of their simplicity. "The sophistication of Andrew Wyeth is in how he handles the medium," says Mrs. Stamets. She originally viewed the Wyeth show at the Metropolitan Museum of Art; this presentation is selected from that show.

Dennis Kirchmann, an independent studio artist-potter, who will give a demonstration of slab and wheel techniques at 10:00 a.m. in AC-1 on October 31. His demonstration will continue through mid-afternoon.

Visiting Artist lectures and demonstrations are open to all interested persons.
