BLACK HISTORY CONVOCATION

A Black History Convocation will be held at ISUE on February 15 beginning at 7:30 p.m. A fellowship hour will begin at 7:00 p.m.

A two-part convocation, the first hour will be a tribute hour with Philip Lawrence, ISUE junior, as chairman. The tribute hour will include invocation by Reverend W. R. Brown, Pastor, New Hope Baptist Church; tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. by Reverend William E. Payne, Pastor, Memorial Baptist Church; showing of a film entitled "Tribute to Malcolm X" with a comment by John Cable, President, Evansville Chapter, N.A.A.C.P. The second hour, a Black History Hour, will feature Carl Lyles of Reitz High School speaking on "Recent Views on Black History"; a film, "Black History: Lost, Stolen, or Strayed" and the hour will end with a benediction by Reverend Earl Rohleder, co-pastor of St. John's Catholic Church. The ISUE Library is preparing a black history display for the convocation showing distinguished American Blacks and the local black community manuscript collection of the ISUE Library.

Open to the public, all sessions of the Black History Convocation will be held in Room 28 of the administration building. Black History Convocation is being sponsored by the Student Government Association.
