

**WILL KEIM TO ADDRESS
USI FRESHMEN ORIENTATION;
23 AMIGOS NAMED**

Internationally known lecturer and humorist Will Keim will give the keynote address during freshman orientation Monday, August 20, at the University of Southern Indiana. Keim, whose career has ranged from educator, residence hall director, and educational program coordinator to campus minister, has lectured to more than 500,000 students on 500 campuses.

In the USI orientation, Keim will address 1,000 freshmen at 10:30 a.m. in the Physical Activities Center. Geared to new students on campus, Keim will explain the purpose of education and the tremendous opportunities available at USI, and discuss three main problems that can hinder a student's progress and college career: alcohol abuse, sex abuse, and drug abuse. His appearance is sponsored by Old National Bank, St. Mary's Convenient Care, and USI.

Other orientation activities will include a welcome to campus by USI's AMIGOs (Ask Me I Give Orientation), a group of USI student leaders who greet and help freshmen learn about USI, and an all-campus picnic from 6 to 10 p.m. at MASH apartments, co-sponsored by Citizens National Bank and USI.

Orientation continues on August 21 with a breakfast allowing each new student an opportunity to meet faculty members; an introductory meeting with the academic dean in a student's major course of study; the production of *Wizard of AIDS*, a musical comedy that provides AIDS awareness through live theatre; and a soccer scrimmage, which will introduce the 1990 soccer team and the USI cheerleaders. A picnic is scheduled in conjunction with the scrimmage, with food provided by Schnucks and Lewis Bakeries. WBKR radio station will be on campus with a live broadcast. Pepsi is donating drinks for the freshmen orientation activities.

The group attended a weekend retreat August 3-5 at Wyandotte Cave, preparing for the two day orientation when each AMIGO is assigned about 40 new students and becomes their link to the student body in the first few weeks of school.
