THE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE ON FILM. "The Last Picture Show," the final film being shown in The American Experience on Film series, will begin at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 10 at Murphy Auditorium in New Harmony. Following the movie, a lecture on "Destructive Forces in the Small Town" will be presented by *Howard Gabennesch*, Assistant Professor of Sociology, with *James Blevins*, Chairman, Division of Humanities, serving as moderator. The American Experience on Film series is

being co-sponsored by ISUE and Historic New Harmony, with funds for the project being provided by the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The series is open to the public at no charge.

NOTICE TO FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF WHO WILL RETIRE IN 1977. Members of the faculty and administrative staff who will retire in 1977 and who are covered under the Indiana State Teachers Retirement Fund must have an option form on file with the fund one year prior to retirement if the member wishes to select a co-survivor option.
