NOTRE DAME THEOLOGIAN TO BE NEWMAN LECTURER. **Dr. Richard P. McBrien**, Crowley-O'Brien-Walter Professor of Theology and chairman of the Department of Theology at Notre Dame University, will be the first annual John Henry Newman Lecturer at USI. He will lecture on Wednesday, February 15 -- "The Politics of Abortion" at 1 p.m. and "Religion and Politics in America" at 7:30 p.m., both in UC350. The public is invited. The program is sponsored by Campus Ministry, initiating an annual lecture program to honor the 19th century Anglican priest who converted to Catholicism and worked with college students to help them grow spiritually as well as intellectually.

VIETNAM WAR HISTORIAN TO LECTURE. **Dr. George C. Herring**, a University of Kentucky professor who is a recognized Vietnam War historian and author of America's Longest War: The United States and Vietnam, 1950-1975, will be the first Sydney Berger Lecturer on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 21 and 22. The Sydney Berger Lecture,

expected to become an annual event to encourage public discussion of social and religious issues, honors the late Evansville attorney as an outstanding citizen and former part-time faculty member at USI. Dr. Herring will deliver a public lecture on "Vietnam, American Foreign Policy, and the Uses of History" at 7:30 p.m. on February 21 in UC350. He will lecture on "Vietnam as History" in a sociology class at 10 a.m. February 22 in Forum I, also open to the public, and will be available to meet with students and faculty during a luncheon meeting at 12 noon in the President's Suite.

LIVING LITERATURE. "Shedding Light on Shakespeare," a new show designed specifically with school curricula in mind, will be presented in a Liberal Arts Forum at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 15, in the USI Theatre. **Mr. Mark Stevenson** and **Ms. Arlene Sterne**, New York actors, perform highlights from "Hamlet," "Macbeth," and "Romeo and Juliet," and place these works in their historical context as they share interesting stories and little-known facts about Elizabethan England and Shakespeare's personal relationship to it. The program is free and open to the public. In addition, three English classes will meet at 12:30 p.m. Thursday, February 16, in Forum II for a lecture on Shakespeare.

WELCOME. The University community welcomes **Mr. W. L. "Rusty" Mundell**, who has been named director for this year's production of "Young Abe Lincoln" at Lincoln State Park. A writer, director, and producer of outdoor dramas in Ohio, Kentucky, and Minnesota, Mr. Mundell has a master's degree from George Washington University and taught at Ohio University. He will join the USI staff in late April to begin work on the summer production and will train a USI Theatre faculty member to continue the program in the future. Mr. Mundell was a writer for the "Wild Kingdom" television series and was casting director for the TV miniseries, "Centennial." He helped found the nonprofit association in 1970 that created "Tecumseh," an outdoor drama in Chillicothe, Ohio. He was producer and artistic director for that theatre for 17 years and directed the show for seven seasons. He also wrote and directed "Blue Jacket," a Xenia, Ohio, outdoor drama, and wrote "Viking," a show presented in Park Rapids, Minnesota.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. **Mr. Larry W. Bohleber**, manager of Business Development Programs, and **Dr. M. Edward Jones**, associate vice president for Academic Affairs, attended the annual conference of the Business, Industry, and Labor Division of the National University Continuing Education Association February 1-3 in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Mr. Bohleber presented a conference session on "The Assessment Center Approach to Successful University-Business Partnerships." Dr. Jones, a member of the BIL executive committee, moderated three sessions on university-business cooperation.

Mrs. Sandra J. Hermann, University Division coordinator, will conduct a session on "Life Planning/Career Planning" during "Women's Day '89" on Saturday, March 18, at Green Convention Center, co-sponsored by WFIE-TV and St. Mary's Medical Center. The day-long program will offer a variety of speakers, booths, exhibitions, and health screenings of interest to women. Admission is \$2; babysitting will be provided by St. Vincent's Day Care at the Executive Inn.

The USI Library has received the five-volume set, Great Lives From History: Ancient and Medieval Series, which includes two "lives" in volume four -- Philo of Alexandria and Priscian the Grammarian -- that were written by **Dr. Daniel C. Scavone**, professor of history. A similar set, The Modern Series of Great Lives, will contain five biographies by Dr. Scavone: Guicciardini, Florentine Renaissance historian; Bramante, Roman Renaissance architect; Tintoretto, Venetian Renaissance painter; Columbus; and Toulouse-Lautrec, post-Impressionist painter. Dr. Scavone's paper, "Augustus, Cicero, and the Roman Revolution," will be on the program of the Indiana Association of Historians' March 4 meeting at Butler University.
