

Student *SPRINT*:

Seniors to direct
"Sprint Scenes"

Ten student directors will take center stage when USI presents "Sprint Scenes" Thursday, December 6, and Friday, December 7.

Each student in the University's Introduction to Design class will direct other USI theatre students in a scene of his or her own selection. Their choices cover a wide variety of dramatic material, ranging from tragic to sentimental.

"The student directors have been required to navigate through a professional directing process in this class. The work included extensive research and responsible preparation for their shows before rehearsals were allowed to begin," said **Mr. Scott LaFeber**, associate professor of theatre.

"Each 'scene' is only about 25-minutes long, so we will be sprinting from one terrific play to another during the evening. And there will be no lack of excitement and energy during the two performance dates."

"Sprint Scenes" will be presented as two shows: Show A and Show B. On December 6, Show A will begin at 6 p.m., followed by Show B at 9 p.m. On December 7, Show B will lead off at 6, followed by Show A at 9.

Show A will include scenes from *The Problem*, *Red Cross*, *Springtime*, *The Glass Menagerie*, and *Naomi in the Living Room*. Show B will include excerpts from *The Red Coat*, *True West*, *Strange Snow*, *Gypsy*, and *Sure Thing*.

"Sprint Scenes" will be staged in the Helen Mallette Studio Theatre in the Liberal Arts Center. Tickets for each show are \$9 adults; \$7 seniors (60+) and students; and \$3 USI students. For tickets or additional information, call the USI Theatre Box Office at 422-3970.








Longtime employee retiring
