PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP LUNCHEON. The USI Foundation will hold its first annual Presidential Scholarship Luncheon at 11:45 a.m. Thursday, November 3, in the University Center, honoring the donors and recipients of the merit scholarships established for Indiana high school students who are valedictorians and salutatorians of their graduating classes. Five Evansville companies and an individual will receive special recognition for contributing the \$18,000 needed to insure funding for a scholarship over the four-year eligibility period. These scholarships have been named for the donors. Students were selected for these awards on the basis of academic excellence, including SAT scores. **Bristol-Myers USPNC** in Evansville contributed \$60,000, supporting three scholarships awarded to **Ms. Paula J. Baughn**, communications major; **Ms. Lisa D. May**, biology; and **Mr. Patrick E. McDonald**, biology and pre-med. Other featured donors and recipients include: **Margaret Henderson Blair Scholarship**, named for the president of Research Systems, Inc., Evansville, awarded to **Ms. Bethany J. Nuss**, mathematics; **Citizens National Bank Scholarship** awarded to **Ms. Stacy L. Bowman**, chemistry; **Escalade Scholarship** awarded to **Mr. William L. Kunkler**, mechanical engineering technology; **National City Bank Scholarship** awarded to **Ms. Melinda G. Grooms**, accounting; and **Old National Bank Scholarship** awarded to **Ms. Lana R. Stoll**, biology.

Funding during the initial year of the scholarship program totals \$82,165, with funding or pledges through 1992 bringing the total to \$210,040. HERSHEL MOORE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED. Ms. Keturah Thomas, a junior political science major, has been awarded the first Herschel Moore Scholarship. The \$2,000 award was established for presentation to a single black woman who is an Evansville resident, with a goal of fostering self-sufficiency. The award is renewable at the same amount for four years if the student maintains at least a 2.5 grade point average, is able to provide 10 percent of her own tuition, and has demonstrated a potential for success. Ms. Thomas is the daughter of Mrs. Wilma Thomas of 420 Jefferson Avenue. She attended Evansville Christian School, then transferred to Mater Dei High School, where she was graduated in 1986. She has been a student employee in the President's Office at USI since June.

The scholarship honors Mr. Herschel Moore, a popular security guard at National City Bank's downtown location who died in 1983 at age 53. Moore had been part of the downtown scene for 15 years, patrolling the bank drive-in facility and parking lot at Third and Locust, developing friendships with nearly everyone who visited the bank or passed the intersection, and becoming a sounding board for the personal problems, plans, and dreams of his passing friends. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Doris Moore, and two daughters, Mrs. Gina Moore Clark and Ms. Joan Moore.

ASSESSMENT DAY/TRAINING DAY. Tuesday, November 15, is the first Assessment Day. The University will begin assessing the capabilities of this year's new freshman students with an ultimate goal of determining the University's impact upon those students and whether needs are being met. NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history and director of Historic Southern Indiana Project, participated in the annual meeting of the California Committee for the Promotion of History, held October 21-23 in Santa Ana, California. On Friday, November 4, he will deliver a paper at the annual meeting of the Midwest Archives Conference in Cincinnati. He will participate in a session on "River City History: Revisiting The Urban Frontier," in which the experiences of Cincinnati, Evansville, St. Louis, and Louisville will be compared.

Dr. Bigham's newest book, An Evansville Album - Perspectives on a River City, 1812-1988, has been published by IU Press. Through more than 200 photos, Dr. Bigham traces the evolution of Evansville, examining where and how people made a living and how and why Evansvillians lived as they did.
